The public has already shown its interest in the Million Days' Work Campaign among Vancouver's thousands of unemployed.

Before the salesmen started out on their rounds this morning 1000 days' work had been placed, and more than \$5000 dollars in hard cash had been subscribed.

The R. C. Pulp and Paper Company Ltd. led off the subscriptions list with a donation of \$2000.

The salesmen have been carefully organized, so that their work will be done at the peak-point of efficiency. They are under the command of a captain, Victor Oresden.

WINTER FAIR AIDS MARKETING PLANS

Remarkable development of the Winter Fair into a great marketing medium for livestock and agricultural produce grown in British Columbia was reported to the Board of Control of the Exhibition Association Wednesday, J. K. Matheson, general manager, reported that a tremendous entry would be shown in every section, and all records would be broken.

The function has now developed into a huge Provincial Fair, with exhibits of beef, mutton, bacon, apples, seeds, potatoes, poultry, flowers, which will all be sold by auction to the highest bidder. Sales of horses, dairy cattle, force, milk, marten, cage birds and rabbits will also be organized.

More than \$120,000 will be realized from the sale, it is reported.

ROBBERY SUSPECT GAINS ACQUITTAL

NEW WESTMINSTER, Dec. 4.—Claiming he had been "framed," Robert McLean was acquitted Wednesday by an Assize Court jury on a charge of breaking and entering the store of F. V. Porter at Murrayville, October 29.

Accused presented to the court an alibi for each incriminating evidence as his hat and driver's license, the latter torn into small bits, which were found by police in Queen's Park and on the Avium grounds, where a major portion of the \$10,300 in bonds, cash, postage stamps and merchandise, taken from the Porter store, were recovered.

McLean conducted his own defense and told the court that the night of the robbery he had had some domestic trouble, was without funds and walked the streets of Vancouver all in his attempt, he claimed, was a "frame-up."

His hat and driver's license, he had left in the room of a man named Hoover on the night of the robbery. Authorities still are searching for Hoover. It was stated.

Verdict of accidental death was returned by the coroner's jury Wednesday at an inquest into the fatal injury of Joseph Lacey November 29, when he fell down the elevator shaft from the ground floor to the basement at the Hotel Glen, where he was employed as janitor. Lacey succumbed at the General Hospital November 29.

Accidental death also was the verdict returned in the inquest on Mrs. Charlotte Ada Jensen, 1225 Grant Street, who died at her home Monday, after a fall in which she was riding November 29, collided with a telephone pole at Clarke Drive and Venables Street.

The jury's verdict said, in part: "The cause of the accident was that the driver of the taxi-cab, viz., Patrick Taylor.

THUGS RELEASE INSANE CROOKS

Six Freed in Raid on Mat-teawan Asylum

 BEACON, N.Y., Dec. 4.—Three men armed with guns invaded Matteawan State Hospital for the criminal insane early today, overpowered four employees and liberated six inmates, one a murderer and another a pyromaniac.

The leader of the gang who was recognized as a former inmate by hospital attendants, who said he was William Nelson of New York.

The six liberated were: Harry Gordon, 35, Rochester; Frank Danvers, 32, New York; Joseph Kaylor, 35, the Bronx; John S. Bangs, 25, New York; John Higgins, 38, Brooklyn; Anthony A. Eddy, 41, Brooklyn.

Dr. Raymond F. C. Kish, Superintendent, said the three men entered the hospital grounds through the rear yard, rounded up all officials and confined them in the office.

While one of them guarded their prisoners the other two went to the front dormitory where the six men were in bed. The six apparently were as soon as the intruders appeared they sprang from their beds and ran out, two of them left clad only in night attire. They drove away in two automobiles.

NORTHERN FISHERS OBJECT TO TRAPS

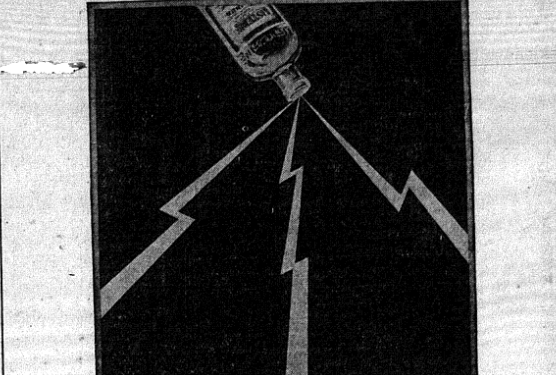
PRINCE RUPERT, Dec. 4.—Strong opposition to any more aerial application of traps in British Columbia waters was voted by the Northern Fishermen's Association at a conference here Wednesday with W. A. Ford, Deputy Minister of Fisheries.

Opposition was also expressed to the proposed increase in the number of fishing licenses granted.

It was felt by the fishermen that traps set in the water to another object be permitted. The proposal to suspend the annual reduction of ten per cent in Japanese fishing licenses was supported.

New proposals made at the Prince Rupert conference were:

That the British Government should employ hunters to destroy the hare seal, this to be supplemented to the existing seal system. That protection be taken off seal pups in the winter months. That obstructions be placed above fishing boundaries in creeks so as to prevent illegal fishing above these boundaries. That trap sales be entirely abolished.
