Eskimos Delight Large Home Crowd With Victory Over Portland 5-1

Three Goals in Opening Session Decides Fast Coast Hockey Game

SEATTLE, Jan. 3.—Playing before the largest and most enthusiastic crowd of the season, when more than 5000 people jammed into the rink, Seattle Eskimos continued their winning streak in the Pacific Coast Hockey League by outplaying and outscoring Portland's best merchants 5-1 here last night.

The victory put the Seattle squad in a tie with Vancouver for the lead, with the Buckaroos only two points back. It was fast hockey throughout, with both teams hitting a fast pace. The Eskis swarmed around the visiting goal for a few minutes in the first frame to score three times and take a lead which was never threatened, though the local defense was kept busy warding off fast attacks.

Portland started the fireworks and the Eskimos finished them. The Buckaroos scored first early in the opening period when McCordick found the Seattle net with a long bulled-like shot. Seattle then opened up with a whirlwind attack but the Portland goalie held his own until Armstrong was penalized.

No sooner had the forward reached the bench than the Eskimos tried to count. Sutherland took a pass from Walker and beat Goals Anderson with a short shot.

RICH GRAIN MART IN CHINA FORESEEN

WINNIPEG, Jan. 3.—Hopes of finding a big market in China for the country's surplus wheat is enticing export agents at this centre. Already a cargo of No. 2 has been sold to Shanghai merchants for immediate delivery. Several tentative offers have been made at other Oriental centres and some large orders are expected to be closed, traders on the Winnipeg Exchange say, in a few days.

Some of these offers are said to be based upon the expectation of credit to be furnished at this end as was forecast in the Regina speech of Hon. R. B. Bennett.

Traders here complain that Eastern Canadian feeders are taking the usual supply of corn from the United States when they could feed the cheap barley they have in hand. They say the money for the three million bushels of American corn would have bought ten million bushels of barley at present values.

Pioneer Settler Called by Death


The Vancouver district had another of its pioneer settlers, January 1, to the death of William Williamson, 75, 707 Marine Drive.
