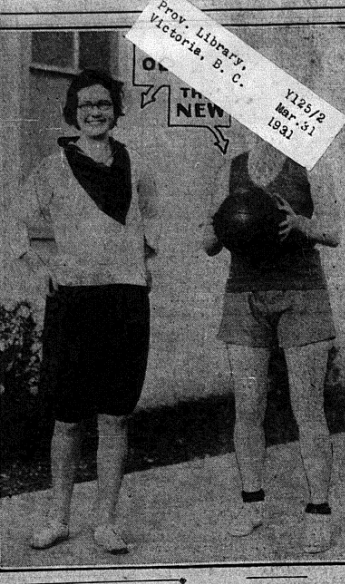

HORRORS CONTINUE AT NAPIER Fugitives Die on Roads as Towns Abandoned

AUCKLAND, N. Z., Feb. 6.—Despatches from Napier today said the heaviest shelling since Tuesday, when Napier, Hastings and other towns of Hawke Bay province were virtually destroyed by an earthquake, were felt throughout the region last night.

Survivors were panic stricken by the latest tremors. The quake traveled from East to West, whereas Tuesday's shock traveled from South to North.
