'Economic War By Russia Spells Ruin To Britain, Germany'

—FARMENIER

PARIS, Feb. 20.—Jean Farmenier, one of the principal authors of the Dawes and Young plans, said today that in a few years Soviet Russia would be in a position to launch an economic offensive which would ruin countries

such as Great Britain and Germany, living largely on their export trade. Farmenier has just returned from a visit to Russia. He asserted the famous five-year plan of which the world has heard so much, already was from 75 to 80 per cent successful, and the economic offensive would come in a few years, almost months.

LONDON.—The Daily Mail understands that the British Government has sanctioned a plan for restriction of the output in Malaya and Nigeria. It will become operative March 1.

Minister Admits Giving Exclusive Coach Franchise

Action Defended by Bruhn as Good Business

VICTORIA, Feb. 20.—Although J. A. Hanna's amendment to the address regarding the government's granting of exclusive bus franchises on the public highway was ruled out of order by Mr. Speaker Davis at the opening of Thursday's sitting of the legislature, the subject of exclusive franchises was warmly debated.

Hon. R. W. Bruhn, minister of public works, assayed a defense of the department's record in granting these licenses.

The minister challenged a statement by Mr. Pattullo, an opposition leader, that an exclusive franchise covering all highways on Vancouver Island had been given to a partisan supporter of the government, who had transferred this franchise to the C. P. R.

"The franchise is still in the hands of the man to whom it was issued," declared Mr. Bruhn.

C. P. R. OFFICERS

"That is a quibble," Mr. Manson interjected, while Mr. Pattullo pointed out that the company was nominally the same, but its executive officers were now C. P. R. officials.

Mr. Bruhn said the license had not been transferred and that the provisions of the act had been complied with.

"Then the minister admits there was an exclusive franchise issued," interjected Mr. Pattullo.

"It was a license for certain schedules in accordance with the act," insisted Mr. Bruhn.

"We know all about the act," said Mr. Pattullo, who then read to the house a letter from the acting minister of public works to an applicant for a public carrier's license between Victoria and Saanichton wharf.

The minister's letter said: "I beg to inform you that a public carrier's license giving exclusive rights over the route covered by your application is already in effect and that under these conditions it is not possible for your application to be given favorable consideration."

Mr. Bruhn then launched into a defense of the company and the department.

LARGE INVESTMENT

It had an investment of \$100,000 in safety coaches, 440,000 in rolling stock, \$165,000 in terminal facilities, traveled one and a quarter million miles and carried one and a half million passengers a year. Its yearly payroll was \$140,000, its purchase \$240,000, of which \$185,000 were made locally, yet its income tax, showing how small were its earnings on this great investment, was only \$1800. Its public carrier license fee was \$1902 and it paid over \$23,000 in road-use tax and motor licenses. During all its operation it had never had an accident.

It was to this company that the franchise had been given in the interests of the safety and comfort of the traveling public, he said.

SPEAKER'S RULING

Mr. Hanna's proposed amendment to the address was ruled out of order by Mr. Speaker Davis on the ground that in granting the minister of public works for granting exclusive bus franchises over the public highway, the amendment denominated a procedure authorized by the Legislature in a statutory enactment of last year.

"The only way this could be done, he said, was by a motion to repeal the clause in the act.

LOAN TO CHINA TO BENEFIT WORLD

The question of a large international loan to China is one which should receive the most careful consideration, said Professor H. Angus of the University of B. C. in addressing the Lions' Club Thursday at the Hotel Georgia.

Such a loan would really be the beginning of a great change in the economic structure of the world and while the change might be of a beneficial nature, it was fraught with danger to the rest of the world if handled in a haphazard manner, he said.

While China is one of the poorest countries per capita, she is well endowed with natural resources. Of man power she has the quantity but not the quality in that she lacks the education which has been such a tremendous asset in the prosperity of the white races.

Continuing, Prof. Angus pointed out that it was somewhat risky to lend money to China on account of the instability of its Government. Any new Government might repudiate a loan if it could argue that the money had been used for political or military purposes to which they were opposed.

"How would it be repaid?" he asked. There were two ways which he could follow. Either she could build up her own industries to fill her needs, and thus reduce her imports or she might export her raw materials.

It is difficult now to say which, but sooner or later China will be pouring out manufactured goods in such great volume that it is going to prove hurtful to some foreign countries.
