SEINES LARGER. Among the more important changes in the salmon fishing regulations in one which establishes the minimum mesh for salmon purse seines at three and a half inches. Another will permit salmon gill nets used in District No. 1, apart from the Fraser River, to have a maximum length of 200 fathoms as compared with a previous maximum of 150 fathoms.

TODAY Continued from Page One spot held only a railroad siding and one small building. It has 12,000 individuals now, and 121,000 acres under intensive cultivation are irrigated from the Yagui River. Storage for enough water to irrigate 900,000 acres more could be built at a cost of only \$5,000,000. The Mexican government doubts it will do it. They harvest the rice crop in December, plant wheat on the same land in January, and harvest that in June. They ship hundreds of carloads of tomatoes and thousands of tons of green peas at a season when the United States does not produce either. You drive through 8000 acres of green peas. The full grown, hard round peas are shipped North because commercial economy demands it. Of the delicate, small, green peas 50 tons a week are packed in the Yagui Fruit Company packing house. Two hundred tons a week in the fields are thrown aside, fed to pigs, horses, cows and donkeys. You will see a contented burro standing in front of a small barrel.

ful of fresh peas. The rice fields and all other crops are worked by machinery and there is none of the hardship of the old rice fields, drudged by hand, a thousand men packed by hand, a thousand men and women picking one great field and morning. Arthur Hoffmann and E. J. Seal run the rice mill for Roseberg Bros. & Co., San Francisco. Three thousand tons of polished rice are piled up in bags in the warehouse. Seventeen thousand tons have been shipped abroad. Europe gets all of this high grade, long grain rice in obedience to public demand, while values appreciate. The rice is milled, the hulls burned in the furnace to produce power, the inner bran is ground off, then the rice is polished pure white and the greater part of its vitamin value has been destroyed. One hundred pounds of high grade rice cost \$3.75. Half a pound of rice will feed a man for a day. the Richardson brothers, of whom only one, William E. survives, began the development of this Yagui Valley delta 40 years ago. Mr. Richardson, with his partner, H. R. Sibbet, continues it. John Hays Hammond and the late Harry Payne Whitney operated the irrigation project, the Mexican government repaid the loan from their rice crop in two years. Fifty thousand acres here are planted in wheat. It is sad to see wheat and rice straw burned, tens of thousands of tons, to get rid of it, when you pay \$20 to \$30 a ton for straw in New York.
