Hon. Joshua Hinchliffe has told the House that
no Rhodes scholar was chosen from the University
during 1930 because the scholarship of the students was
not sufficiently high to warrant the applicament.
In a dignified and conclusive reply, the heads of the
various faculties at the University have pointed out
that the Rhodes appointment, was not made in 1930
because no student could be found who was walling
to take it.

1. Because the Rhodes appointment calls, for a high degree of afflicit-prowess as well as scholarship and the potential qualified candidates did not feel like sacrificing their laboratory hours for the sake of grid-

2. Because those students who intended to take
post-graduate work had already selected divieraities
other than Oxford for their courses.

Mr. Hinchliffe cuts \$150,000 off the University
estimates because, as he says, he wants the principle
of quality rather than size to prevail at the University.
What finer quality of scholarship could Mr. Hinchliffe desire than that which rejects a Rhodes reward
rather than neglect studies for athletics? Can there
be any complaint about the quality of education at
the University when students have been awarded
scholarships to a total value of \$337,000 in universit
ties other than Oxford?.

The truth is that Mr. Hinchliffe has disproved
his own case in bringing up the matter of the Rhodes
scholarship. He wants to create out in Point Grey a
university modelled on Oxford, exclusive, cultural and
classical in tone. The most potent argument agains
this proposition is the fact that British Columbia students do not feel that Oxford is suitable for their needs.
