

FRANCHISES SOLD FOR APPEASE

80 WAR VETERANS SERVED DOMINION

B.C. Only Province Where Vote Right Withheld

By Sun Staff Correspondent. VICTORIA, March 22.—Officers of the Canadian Legion are in the capital today urging the Legislature to grant the provincial franchise to the 80 war veterans of the Dominion who served in the Canadian forces.

The Dominion and every other province has granted to all veterans of the C. E. F. the right to vote, they say. Only British Columbia has denied this right of citizenship to a small group of men who displayed the quality of their Canadian citizenship by offering their lives to defend this country in war time.

The Legionnaires believe that if the province is to give the subject more favorable consideration than the last time a vote was taken, it is explained that there is no proposal to perpetuate the franchise through the ages and, therefore, these men, the vote is to die with them, according to the terms of the proposed amendment.

It is pointed out that the 80 men have lived in B. C. for more than 20 years, that they speak good English, that they have no criminal record, that they are of good character, and that they are Canadian standards of living and government.

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ICE FREES WIKING RESCUE STEAMERS

JOHNS, Nfld., March 22.—The storm was running up on the east coast of the Viking drama this morning when the wind off Horse Island veered to the westward, breaking the grip of the ruffed ice and freeing the ships that had lagged to the rescue when the 60-year-old Rasmusson and his party, partly aboard, headed by Varick Prissel, blew on a week ago last night.

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L. KENNEDY DIES SUDDENLY AT HOME

Edman Duxter Kennedy, 57, manager of the British Columbia branch of Hsuan and Risch Ltd., died at 8 o'clock this morning after a collapse which occurred while he was preparing to leave his home at 3763 West Twenty-seventh.

Although he had not been in good health for some time, two years ago, he was appointed manager of the company, with which he has been associated for 19 years.

He was born in the British West Indies. Mr. Kennedy came to Vancouver in 1911, and was in the firm of Hsuan and Risch as an accountant. He was appointed manager in 1912.

Mr. Kennedy is survived by his wife and two children, Joan and Harry, at home, also a sister in Los Angeles, Cal.
