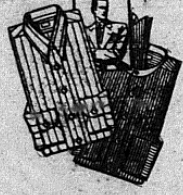

B.C. LIFE SAVERS SALES ON INCREASE

Merle E. Bates, advertising manager and director of Sales of Life Savers Ltd., Prescott, Ontario, who is visiting Vancouver, advised today that the sales of his company's products during the first two months of 1931 for British Columbia as compared to the same period of 1930 showed a 23.6 per cent increase, which is a greater increase than that shown for the Dominion of Canada, which was a 13.4 per cent.

In his interview with a representative of the Sun he pointed out that this increase was not due to any abnormal sales condition or special deals offered by his company, but was a natural increase attributable entirely to his company's newspaper advertising throughout the year, and the figure is based on actual shipments to dealers in the territory, which are a reflection of the demand from consumers for the product.

ACCIDENT FUND TO PAY BOARD WAGES

VICTORIA, March 25.—Under a bill amending the Workmen's Compensation Act, consolidated and revised, will be relieved of the \$16,500 paid in wages to members of the legislature, the amount will be taken from the accident fund.

The bill was given second reading in the Legislature Tuesday after criticism on this point and the score that workmen throughout the province would be disappointed while the Act was opened none of the things for which they had repeatedly petitioned the Government had been included.

It was declared unfair by Opposition speakers that industry, already burdened, should be charged with the amount especially in view of the fact that better inspection, electric engineering inspection and administration of Old Age Pensions were included in the duties of the board.

He urged that customs, immigration and other port officials be considerate and courteous in dealing with them.

Property owners submitted a petition to have the work done under the local improvements plan. Under the scheme, the street would be 56 feet wide.

The Board yesterday approved the commencement of the initiative principle of the permanent paving of Twenty-first Avenue from Cambie to Ash Street, and the widening of Forty-first Avenue from Granville to Chancery Street, which property owners asked.

How to Play the Guitar

By PROF. T. F. BENSON, Teacher of Stringed Instruments

LESSON 10

Here is a pleasant diversion from the usual study of the melody notes. The bass notes are open strings. You will notice lines joining the notes together. They are known as sliding lines. They mean that the steel must remain on the string, and made to slide in the slot indicated, but watch the time, and keep fingers flat on strings behind steel.

Note the change in the time. It is 3-4, not 4-4. It is three beats to a bar.

Practise hard at this.

GOV'T IRRIGATION PLAN CRITICIZED

VICTORIA, March 25.—Discovery of the appointment of a superintendent

of irrigation, a new official, led to examination in the Legislature Tuesday night of the Government's policy with regard to irrigation loans.

Mr. D. Pettullo demanded a statement from Hon. N. S. Loughheed, Minister of Lands, whether the Government intended to hasten upon repayment in full of new money advanced to irrigation districts under the Conservation fund.

"We hope these advances, used to rehabilitate the irrigation systems, will put the districts on their feet so that the burden will not be too great," Mr. Loughheed said. "It may be that we shall have to spread the payments over a longer term of years."

100-FOOT HIGHWAY PROVISION RAPPED

VICTORIA, March 25.—Fears that the Government might embark upon a Tupper policy are ahead of the times and build a 100-foot highway

The bill gives the minister power to appropriate 100 feet for highway purposes instead of the usual 50 feet, but was defeated by Hon. E. W. Bruhn.
