The report shows that 14,623,318 passengers were carried on 1,000,000 flights during the last six months of 1930, compared with 1,462,331 passengers on 100,000 flights during the first six months of the year.

The report also shows that the number of accidents per 100,000 passengers carried decreased from 1.5 in the first six months to 0.15 in the last six months of the year.
