THESE BANDITS GET 3 YEARS; CAMPBELL ONE YEAR

Carmine Cardarelli, Slayer, to Serve Five Years --- Other Sentences

Thirty lashes and a total of forty-one years, six months in penitentiary and jail were meted out to eleven men and one woman by Mr. Justice Murphy at the close of the Spring Assizes today.

Another man was allowed to go free on suspended sentence and yet another was sentenced to the time he had spent in jail while awaiting trial.

All fourteen had been convicted of offenses during the assize session just ended.

The court was particularly severe with bandits, labeling them "potential murderers."

He was also stern with Allan Campbell, Communist leader, but showed sympathy for John Cunningham, also a Communist.

He expressed regret in having to send Carmine Cardarelli, convicted of manslaughter, to the penitentiary.

Thousands, gathered to hear the sentences imposed, were warned by the court that any demonstration would be considered contempt of court.

After the sentences had been imposed, the crowds massed on Hornby street to watch the prisoners being placed in the provincial police wagon and taken to Okalla. Police fooled spectators by slipping the prisoners through the Howe street entrance.

Sentences were as follows: Roy Salmon, 18, and Lester J. Daint, 18, breaking and entering; 2 years each.

Francis McDougall, 25, robbery with violence; 3 years and 10 lashes. McDougall was the man who broke into the home of William Wilson, the latter was killed by a police officer.

Allan Campbell, 30, inciting to riot against soldiers; 3 years and 10 lashes. Campbell was sentenced to one year on probation.

John Cunningham, 48, inciting to riot; 6 months.

Max Pridmore, 45, manslaughter and attempted illegal operation, 5 years on both counts, sentence to run concurrently.

John Rogers, 30, assault causing actual bodily harm, suspended sentence.

Charles Leonard, 20, manslaughter, one year in penitentiary.

John Campbell, 30, manslaughter, 3 years.

John Grayson, 31, robbery with violence, 3 years.

Robert Smith, 15, breaking and entering, 1 year.

Alfred Peters, 25, shooting with intent to kill, 1 year.
