PUT OF JAIL AT BELLINGHAM

Four Times in Effort to Shoot Guard; Had Sawed Bars of Cell

BELLINGHAM, Wash., May 18.—William Bagley, ex-convict, held in the Whatcom county jail for Canadian authorities in connection with the blowing of a safe at the Harrison Hot Springs Hotel, April 27, attempted to shoot his way out of the jail this morning. He engaged in a gun battle with Jailer Bruce Loop and his desperate attempt at escape failed only when his revolver misfired three times.

Eagley received a flesh wound in the right thigh as Loop chased him about the main tank of the jail, firing six shots. Bagley threw down his gun and surrendered. Loop was making the customary rounds of the jail at I am, when Bagley, who had sawed his way out of his cell, unddenly met the jailer as he was rounding a hallway. Bagley, with revolver drawn, ordered Loop to "shift them up." He then fired point blank at the jailer, but the gun did not discharge. He pulled the trigger four times, only one builet coming out.

Loop then drew his gun and chased Bagley into a corner, where he surrendered.


