WORLD'S GREATEST PRINCE

FILIPINO PASSENGER RUNS AMOK WITH KNIFE ON C.P.R. LINER; HELD AFTER DESPERATE FIGHT

TOKYO, June 5.—A Filipino steamer passenger stabbed two persons to death and wounded twenty-nine others today on the Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Canada, bound from Vancouver, B. C., to Yokohama. The Filipino, Gregencio Biles, 42, ran amok with a scimitar, stabbing the Chinese carpenter, members of the crew, officers of the ship armed with pistols, cornered the killer and placed him in irons for trial at Hong Kong. Biles suddenly flashed his knife in the steerage. There and along a crowded alley he stabbed without warning, sometimes from behind. He was held after a desperate fight.

Jurado Falter in Final for British Golf Title

By Associated Press CARNOUSTIE, Scotland, June 5.—Tommy Armour, Canadian open champion, today won the British open golf championship after Jose Jurado, the Argentine star, tossed away a great chance for victory on the last nine. Armour's score was 296 for 72 holes. Armour, known as the "Black Scot" and a veteran of some of the hardest fighting of the world war, finished with a par cracking, 71 after previous rounds of 78, 75, 77.
