1160 POSTMASTERS 'FIRED' IN 8 YEARS

More than 85,000 names have been recorded up till noon today in the 1931 census here. It is estimated by the census takers.

Every person in every home in Vancouver will be listed before the year is completed, which will be in less than a month.

Nurse-maids and lodgers, children and adults, all will be reckoned in the count.

No matter how big and no matter how small, each family with its own head of household is a family in the census.

On the whole, census enumerators are finding Vancouver citizens courteous and willing to assist them in every way.

It is an idea that they will be presented if they don't give out the absolutely exact information to be held by people, but it is not altogether correct.

If the exact information about such questions as the value of the home or the amount of earnings is not known by the person giving an estimate, it is possible to correct an estimate as far as possible.

Citizens who are suspicious that the enumerator is not a bona fide one should ask to see his credentials.

Grain Exports to Reach 70,000,000 Bushels by August

Shipments to Date Total 64,607,168 Bushels

Again—Black and White

Grain shipments from the Port of Vancouver totalling considerably more than 70,000,000 bushels are assured before the present crop year ends August 31, figures released today by Vancouver Grain Exchange indicate.

Total shipments at 8 a.m. Tuesday morning for this season aggregated 64,607,168 bushels, as against only 42,748,174 bushels at the corresponding point in the previous crop year.

Ships are now loading, to load and loaded are to take 1,272,667 bushels and commitments for June loading total 4,238,000 bushels, while for July 149,000 bushels, and August 117,000 bushels, are already on order.

The terminal elevator and railway yard situation continued easy with ample accommodation for handling and shifting of cars. At 9 a.m. Tuesday the elevators reported 12,553,733 bushels in store, while the railways combined had 88,000 bushels in cars west of the B. C. boundary.

Shipments to United Kingdom and the European continent have accounted for 75 per cent of exports via Vancouver so far this crop year. U. K. and Europe taking 47,518,119 bushels; the Orient 14,612,112 bushels; Central and South America, 1,435,159 bushels and other countries the remaining 750,000.

BEEF GRADING PLAN SUPPORTED

Livestock men will be interested in the following except from the review of the livestock market and meat trade for 1930, which will appear in the Eleventh Annual Review published by the Dominion Live Stock Branch:

"The beef grading policy of the Department of Agriculture has been excellent progress under the very good co-operation afforded by packing industries and trade, and as well by the consuming public who have shown a decided tendency to increase their confidence in this effort to guarantee the quality of the product to them. Undoubtedly a great deal of strength was injected into the market by the rapid increase in volume, particularly in the eastern cities such as Montreal, Toronto and Ottawa.
