Publication of results of civic health survey and health content tests of milk "is the simplest and most effective way" to enforce health regulations, Dr. J. W. "We filed results of the experience," Dr. McIntosh said, "and the results are so good that we are now publishing them. Only 10 per cent of the milk samples were found to be satisfactory. The results of the health survey are also being published. This will compel retailers to equalize standards."
