Lindberghs Favor Hudson Bay Route For Hop to Japan

NEW YORK, June 18.—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh has tentatively decided on the route for his forthcoming flight to the Orient.

He said today he and his wife were working on the Great Circle Route leading northward to Hudson's Bay, over to Point Barrow, Alaska, down Bering Strait to the Aleutian Islands, and along them to Japan.

Whether they actually fly this route, however, depends among other things, on their ability to arrange for fuel depots along the way.

Lindbergh said he might fly back solo across the Pacific, leaving his wife to follow by steamer.
