BERRY PRICES COMING DOWN

Straws Selling for 5 Cents Box Today

Berries and early summer vegetables showed a slight decrease in price today at the city market.

Strawberries were on sale at some stalls for 5 cents a box, at others they were 10 cents or three for 20 cents.

Local tomatoes were selling at the market 28 cents a pound, or five cents cheaper than a week ago.

Carrots were three bunches for 10 cents, while last Friday they were 5 cents a bunch straight.

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SUPERTAX SECRECY DECLARED ABSURD

VICTORIA, June 19.—Returning to Victoria from meetings in the Fraser Valley, T. D. Pattullo, B. C. Liberal leader, today renewed application to Hon. J. W. Jones, minister of finance, for information as to the amount of revenue received from the 1 per cent income tax.

"It is not the slightest reason for secrecy of the public having the right to know how much this special tax is producing. The returns are submitted every month.

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HALF MILLION DOLLAR JOB TO START SOON

Tenders for the construction of the new pressure tunnel to carry water from Captain under the First Narrows to the south shore, are being received by R. A. Macdonald, chief commissioner, Greater Vancouver Water District. These are to be in by Thursday, June 25, at 4:30 p.m.

The work which will cost approximately \$500,000 includes the excavation and lining of two vertical shafts, each approximately 10 feet in depth. The south shaft will be located near the present water district works in Stanley Park and with the exception of the upper 60 feet the excavation will be through rock.

The north shaft will be located to the east of the district's present pipe line right-of-way through the Indian reserve. Rock in this shaft lies about 110 feet below high water, while the surface of the ground at this point is about 10 feet under high tide level.

The work of building shafts and tunnel will be completed by June 1, 1925.

150 HOMELESS AFTER FLOOD

LONDON, June 19.—A measure aimed to curb the abuse of the British dole system has been framed by the government and introduced into the House of Commons by Minister of Labor Mr. Hon. Margaret Macdonald.

The bill deals with the misuse of the system brought about by an anonymous disclosure in the act's operation during the recent investigation by the Royal Commission on unemployment insurance, which estimated there were costing the unemployment fund some \$25,000,000 annually.

The bill provides machinery for wiping out such abuses as workers who turn suddenly unemployed by claiming the dole for unemployment in their usual occupation.
