BIG TOLL BRIDGE FOR FRASER RIVER Double-Deck Span Projected for Port Mann

NEW WESTMINSTER, June 30.—Plans for a new double-deck railway and toll highway bridge to cross the Fraser River at Port Mann, three miles above New Westminster, have been prepared. It is understood from reliable sources that the Federal Government sanction for the estimated \$1,900,000 and \$2,000,000 will be required. Promoters of the Port Mann bridge are stated to be W. C. Pittman and Cameron Construction Co. The Provincial Government has already sanctioned the plans, it is reported, and has tentatively agreed to construct the necessary bridge approach.

It is understood that negotiations are being conducted to have the Port Mann bridge transferred to the Fraser River and from Vancouver and New Westminster to the Port Mann bridge from the present New Westminster bridge. Highway traffic tolls proposed are stated to be lower than the scale of rates reported for the latter bridge. It is also stated that the bridge will be operated as a private enterprise and at the end of 20 years in which time it is expected the bond issue will be taken care of; it will be handed over to the Provincial Government.

On the south shore of the Fraser highway would connect the bridge with the Pacific highway or run due south to make connections at the present Port Mann bridge. On the north shore the bridge would link up with the transportation highway. This would give a direct route to Vancouver via Coquitlam and Burnaby. The proposed route is stated to be shorter than the latter route from the border to Vancouver. The site of the bridge is above the head of deep-sea navigation and it is understood there would not be opposition from shipping interests.

C.P.R. MAY EARNINGS REVEAL INCREASE

MONTREAL, June 30.—Net earnings of the Canadian Pacific Railway for the month of May were \$2,642,846, against \$1,925,125 in the like month of 1930, an increase of \$717,721, and the first since January of the current year. This gain was entirely the result of efficient substitution of fuel in operation, for gross earnings of \$1,904,330 for the month were \$2,000,000 less than the corresponding month of 1930. Operating expenses were cut from \$1,111,381 in 1930 to \$1,015,617 in May of the current year. For the first three-month period ending this month gross earnings were \$8,955,325, a decline of \$11,48,254.

ANOTHER CRISIS FOR LABOR GOVERNMENT

LONDON, June 30.—Another political "crisis" with the usual predictions of a government defeat and possible resignation, faced last night after a meeting of the Parliamentary Labor Party, at which the party decided to stand firmly by its amendment to demand that J. H. Chamberlain's land tax proposal. This amendment, which provides for exemption from the tax of certain agricultural holdings, was understood that the government intends to oppose it. The Laborists have no doubt that this time there will be no compromise, and the cabinet government will give a defeat, which would be inevitable, especially since the Lloyd George Liberals and Sir John Simon group would be united in voting against the Laborists.

Bull shares were depressed by the announcement of the Interstate Commerce Commission's schedule of hearings on the freight rate plan, ending closing prices for the carriers. Declines were largely in the 1 to 3 point range. The turnover was around 3,000,000 shares.

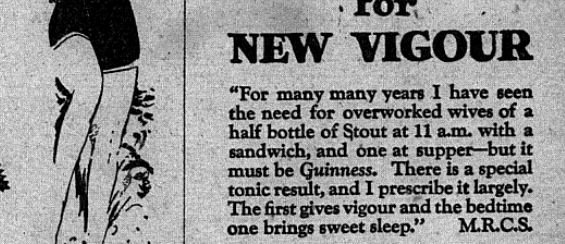
