MEXICO CITY, Oct. 20.—Forty agents today investigated reports that a large ship of unknown nationality had been sighted 300 miles off the coast of Mexico on a line between the Gulf of Mexico and the Caribbean Sea.

The ship was described in consular dispatches as resembling a small steamer with a large superstructure and a large funnel. It was reported to be carrying a large quantity of arms and ammunition.
