Winch Charges Tories With 'Jockeying'

VICTORIA, Dec. 8.—C.C.F. supporters jammed Spencer's dining room last night (several people were turned away because of lack of food and space). Saturday night, for a victory dinner in honor of the C.C.F. members in the Legislature.

NO JOCKEYING
Harold Hinch, C.C.F. chief and leader of the Opposition, was the principal speaker.

"He said his party is not out to play politics or manoeuvre for position, but will support legislation that is good and oppose legislation that is bad.

The Conservatives, he said, in the present crisis, are jockeying for position. The C.C.F., he said, will not be jockeyed into any position, nor will it allow British Columbia to be dragged into any position, merely to suit some interests.

The main policy of the C.C.F., Mr. Hinch said, is victory abroad and security at home. The C.C.F. is not a party, representing capitalists, having nothing better than "paragonism in time of peace and destruction in time of war."

FINANCIAL VICTORY
Regarding the present B. C. political situation, Mr. Hinch said "we are not planning how we can put Mr. Hartz or Mr. Mathland on the spot—we want to be a constructive force in the interests of this province.

"It is in this time is not so far distant when, for the first time in Canadian history, the working class will give into the hands of their own representatives the reins of power—and we will prove that democracy will work, if only the people will give it a chance."

Emergency Measures Put Into Operation

Quick action to prevent sabotage by Japanese nationals and to forestall anti-Japanese actions by the civilian population of Vancouver has been taken by RCMP officials here. Safety measures include:

- 1. Internment of all "undesirable" Japanese;
- 2. Tying up of every Japanese-owned fishing boat in B.C.
- 3. Closing of all Japanese language schools;
- 4. Newspapers printed in Japanese forbidden to publish.

These measures have been taken by the RCMP on the recommendation of the Standing Committee on Orientals in British Columbia which was preparing for the present emergency for the past year.

The committee, under chairmanship of Mayor F. J. Hume of New Westminster, has been in almost constant session since the declaration of war by Canada upon Japan at 6 p.m. Sunday. It will meet daily while the situation remains acute.

9000 NATIONALS
Sergeant J. Baird of the RCMP in the Standing Committee, stated today that a number of Vancouver Japanese newspapers have been closed. The roundup is continuing throughout Canada.

"The registration of Orientals completed under the RCMP committee disclosed that there are about 9000 Japanese nationals in Canada," he said. "The nationals will now have to report once a month to the RCMP."

"They must sign a statement that they will comply with all regulations enforced as war measures. If they fail to do so, they will be liable to immediate internment."

"Japanese fishermen have been ordered to take their boats immediately to the RCMP office by the committee. This order applies to Canadian-born Japanese; Japanese nationals have not been allowed to hold fishing licenses in B.C."

POSSIBLE TROUBLE
Japanese language schools and newspapers have been closed down in order to eliminate possible causes of friction between the Japanese and the white population.

"If the white population saw a Japanese paper which they could not understand they would be quite suspicious and trouble might result," Sergeant Baird said.

In Canada there are four Japanese language papers and all are published in Vancouver. The papers are: The Japanese Daily, published by Japanese-Canadians in English.

The interned Japanese will be treated the same as the Germans, Italians and others who have been held under the Defense of Canada regulations. They will still be allowed to carry on their business and earn their living.

It was stated that the position of the Japanese fishermen who have had their source of income cut off by the tying up of boats is a particularly one that local authorities and the provincial Government will have to deal with.

EVERY PRECAUTION
Sergeant Baird stated that every precaution has been taken to see that there will be no opportunity for violence or vandalism.

City officers are patrolling the Japanese section of the city with great care and the work will be continued. It was announced that the Standing Committee on Orientals, which is in charge of the Japanese situation, is composed of Mayor F. J. Hume of New Westminster, chairman; Col. A. W. Sparling, D.S.O.; Lt.-Col. Mangregor Macintosh, President of the H. F. Angus and Assistant Commissioner F. J. Mead.

Professor Angus and Commissioner Mead will be present in Ottawa but they will return to the city if the situation requires it.

All Service Men Obey
Hasty Call at Victoria

VICTORIA, Dec. 8.—Victoria's streets, usually crowded with days with sailors, soldiers and airmen, were almost deserted by Sunday night as the men reported here-up calls to return to their barracks.

Station wagons from headquarters of the three services patrolled the waterfront taking sailors and soldiers away from their girlfriends and hustling them back to duty.

In every one of the hundred and fifty places where the men in uniform gather, the service police visited and told the fighters the time had really come to get going.

Wire to Mr. King Turgeon Urges Act Extension

Extension of the Mobilization Act to include military service in any part of the Western Hemisphere and Siberia was urged yesterday by J. Gray Turgeon, Liberal member of Parliament for Carleton, in a telegram to Premier King.

Mr. Turgeon urged instant action against Japan by executive authority "without awaiting a special session of Parliament." His wire was sent to Ottawa before the Dominion declared war upon Japan.

The text of Mr. Turgeon's telegram follows: "As member of the Common House of Parliament, I strongly recommend that the Canadian Government take all possible action against Japan through executive authority without awaiting special session of Parliament."

"I also urge that your Government take favorable action upon my recommendations (made during the last House session), first that a ministry for war be created, and secondly that the National Mobilization Act be extended to include military service in any part of the Western Hemisphere and in Siberia and that further extension be considered from time to time as circumstances warrant."
