Jap Fishboat Sales To Stgrt in Week

Committee Ready to Start Supervision of Sales As Soon as 'Go-Áhead' Signal Comes From Naval Authorities

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First sales of Jap fishboats, under supervision of the Japanese Fishing Fleet Disposal Committee, will be completed before the end of next week, A. E. McMaster, executive assistant to the committee, assured me today.

"We are ready to start as soon as the navy gives us the "go-ahead" signal. By this he means the "go-ahead" signal which will permit inspection of vessels tied up on the British Columbia Coast.

MEASURES TAKEN

A statement by Mr. McMaster today was aimed at rumors and uncertainty prevalent among those who want to buy the Jap fishboats. It has been said that some Japanese would refuse to sell their boats, and if they did sell they would refuse to sell the nets and gear that go with it.

There has been some propa-"There has been some propaganda spread among the Japaness, but we have taken measures calculated to defeat it,"
Mr. MoMaster told me.

He believes that there will be no difficulty in prevailing upon the Japs to sell their boats and gear to bonafide fishermen.

The committee is most interested in outright sale transactions. When the committee was appointed by Ottawa, it was announced that there would be sales, leases and charters.

There may be some leases and charters later on, it is understood

Although actual sales have not yet begun, the committee is moving as fast as possible by stimulating negotiations between Jap owners and prospective buyers.
When the "go-ahead" signal
comes, Mr. McMaster believes that scores of transactions will have already been completed and will require only approval of the committee.

LIST NEARLY READY

The list of Jap boats in the fleet, coupled with the owners' names and addresses, is being names and addresses, is being drawn up. It will be ready in a day or two.

In connection with nets and In connection with the same gear, much of which has been taken off the boats by the Jap owners and stored at Steveston and other points, the Japanese Fishing Fleet Disposal Committee has no authority to deal with its sale or disposal.

However, the matter is to be taken up by the committee, and it is possible that Ottawa may extend life committee's powers

in that direction.

When the committee is ready when me committee is ready to go, next week, any fishboat buyer may get in touch with an owner by inquiring at the com-mittee's office in the Marine Building.

A fisherman told me today that some Japanese fishboat owners will refuse to sell their boals.

Someone has told them that If they hang on to boats and gent they may yet get back into the fishing industry in British Columbia," he said.

He also declared that Japa-nese fish collectors in Steves-ton are planning to keep their businesses, and let white men "Gummles" handle collecting



The first big batch of B. C. incubator chicks have arrived

incubator chicks have arrived on the 1942 scenery. Thousands of fluffy little cheepers wiggle about. In their scrupulously sanitary trays with their discarded shells all around them, trying hard to find a foothold in this strange new world they have literally broken into.

What a "blitz" of chicks! What a chorus of peeps and cheeps in the service of science as applied by modern methods

applied by modern methods to poultry production on a grand scale. Chicks and more chicks: Chicks for Churchill—chicks for division?

More chicks for the Domin-ion because more chicks mean more pullets and pullets as well as bullets are an essential part of Canada's war ef-fort.

Chicks for Churchill so that the great leader of the British Commonwealth of Nations may have two eggs with his breakfast bacon once more.

MORE EGGS

Victory because increased production of eggs has become an integral part of the patriotic pattern.

one pattern.

More and more eggs are urgently needed for feeding the fighting forces defending the threatened shores of the Old Land—where Canada's sons

Billions of eggs are wanted for the whole population of the "right little—tight little island" that has become the bastion and bulwark of a way of life that includes bacon and eggs for breakfast.

The egg contracts with the British Ministry of Food run British Ministry of Food Fun-into astronomical figures. To the ordinary housewife who buys them by the modest dozen the millions of dozens called for staggers the egg imagin-

Huge consignments have reached their destinations in the past year. Still larger or-ders are waiting to be filled and shipped.

So these little squeaking, squirming leghorns, Plymouth rocks, Rhode Island reds, New Hampshires, light Sussex and Jersey white glants, represent-ing the aristocracy of the poul-try kingdom, have an import-ant part to perform in the war program.

CHICK SEXING

Only a few days ago, a voice on the CBC re-broadcasting a ration report from Britain repeated the word—"EGGS"—with a pathetic inflection that arrested my attention, "EGGS?"—there was an intonation in the property that had a hungry. but hopeful quality. "EGGS—once in a blue moon"—the ration report ended on a sort of despairing crescendo.

So—come on chicks—you're in the army now—I feit like shouting as I watched the vanguard of the first 50,000 of "the chicks which give results" chicks which give results" show what they could do by way of surmounting all initial

No ordinary chicks these. Super chicks for super-eggs is their super-job.

With Spartan determination the deft hands of the expert chick-sexer, who in this case is a charming Canadian girl, swiftly separates the sheep

from the goats—or rather the chick "female of the species" from the cockerels.

This 'selective process is drastic; only the survival of the super-fittest is tolerated, accounting for the stupendous increase in production at this particular hatchery during the last 10 years.

From 70,000 in 1923, to 560,-000 in 1941, is some record. This season, with a new 50,000 capacity incubator added to the hattery already in full use far higher figures and results are assured.

Government reports chant a perpetual chorus—"Wanted: 2 more eggs per month from every farm hen." Total war means total effort, even for Biddy, the hen, now raised to the rank of Queen of the Barnyard.

RIGID SUPERVISION

All selection of breeding pens comes under rigid government supervision. Only pure-bred stock of healthy and vigorous ancestry is permitted the privilege of contributing a full quota of eggs to the war-depleted larders of the Allies. Incubation is carried through every stage and process according to scrupulously scientific rules and regulations.

From this hatchery, the larg-From this natchery, the later est in British Columbia, it is expected this year to distribute approximately 750,000 chicks to all parts of Western Canada. Already a large and increasing number of orders is viating to be filled, and, ship-results start immediately. ments start immediately.
