

Shipyard Pickets Put to Flight

TACOMA (AP)—Nearly 1,000 American Federation of Labor shipyard workers today overwhelmed a reinforced picket line of about 400 independently-organized welders and, swinging "tin" helmets and brawny fists, pushed them a mile and a half down a factory-walled right-of-way by sheer weight of numbers. It was the second consecutive day in which demonstrating welders were beaten and put to flight by workers at the Seattle-Tacoma shipyard.

Similar scenes on a smaller scale were enacted simultaneously at the Birchfield Boiler Works three miles away.

In each case, the greatly outnumbered policemen on duty at the yard gates stepped aside when the melee started.

The pickets massed at the shipyard gate about 6.30 a.m., watched by about 25 policemen, as the day shift of shipyard workers went inside.

By apparently pre-arranged strategy, instead of going on shift the newcomers joined the shift going off duty and then pushed through the gates in the pre-dawn darkness and charged the welders.

The main body of the pickets, under orders of their spokesman, Charles L. Brinkerhoff, who was beaten yesterday, withdrew up the road toward the main highway, a mile and a half away, as the shipyard workers charged to battleries of "Don't be a 'white Jap'" and "Work for Uncle Sam!"

Several pickets, however, were cut off from their own main

Transfer 37 Jap Fishing Boats

VANCOUVER (CP)—Transfer of 37 vessels of the Japanese fishing fleet impounded by naval authorities when Japan entered the war, has been completed here by the committee set up to handle the deals.

Gillnetters, trawlers, seiners and packers are included in the 37 boats sold to white fishermen and cannery companies. Among the better-known boats which have changed hands are the 61-foot packer Western Chief, the gillnetter Mary H. No. 2 and the packer Horukade.

Vessels in the fleet which might prove suitable for use as fire boats in Vancouver harbor have been inspected by members of a committee named for the purpose.
