

se Leaves For Road Camps In The Rockies

FAMILIES MAY FOLLOW LATER

Vanguard of thousands of Japanese who will leave the coastal areas of the province for the duration, 100 men who are nationals of Japan left Vancouver at 7:15 p.m. last night for roadwork camps in the Rockies.

In two C.N.R. colonist cars, the Japanese men accustomed to working in the open left for points near the B. C.-Alberta border.

Two R.C.M.P. constables in "civvies" were in each car and are answerable for the Japanese until they reach the Rocky Mountains. Half will arrive today at Rainbow and half at Lucerne. Both points are in B. C., near Red Pass Junction, 44 miles west of Jasper, Alta.

MANY ARE MARRIED
About 400 Japanese, friends and relatives of the workmen bound for the interior to build roadcamps to accommodate others, were at the station to bid them farewell. It is expected that families will be reunited later when adequate accommodation has been built.

Of the first contingent about half are married. Almost all were outdoor workers, carpenters, laborers, skilled and semi-skilled. Young men appeared to be in the majority.

Many carried stout new work boots and warm outer garments. All were between 18 and 45, a group that numbers about 1714 by official census. In future the age limits for nationals offered road work will be "inclusive" of these ages, and will include about 2000.

ALL VOLUNTEERS.
Earlier yesterday, motor buses in the Fraser Valley picked up the Japanese, many of whom are from farms, and brought them to Vancouver. Others come from Vancouver Island and other points on the lower coast.

All are volunteers. It is understood that they are not rigidly restricted to the work and the region to which they are now being assigned. Later, if jobs can be had elsewhere beyond the limits of the protected area, individual Japanese will be free to leave the roadcamps for new jobs.

Pay in the camps will be 25 cents an hour. Married men assign \$20 monthly to wives. For an eight-hour day the pay is 70 cents more than an army private receives. It is understood that the government will provide quarters and food.

Qualicum Asks Incorporation

QUALICUM BEACH, Feb. 24.
A largely attended meeting here last night gave hearty endorsement to the proposal that this district be organized into a village municipality. The meeting was sponsored by the Board of Trade with the president, H. J. Welch, in the chair. For some time the board has been conducting a thorough study of the project in all its angles.

The investigating committee presented its findings in a comprehensive report read by the secretary, E. D. Thwaites.

It found that of the 19 districts in the province which achieved village incorporation not one reverted to its former status. They now have assets of \$223,000 in excess of their liabilities. Ten are totally clear of liabilities.

MEETING IS UNANIMOUS

Kitsilano Ratepayers Demand Jap Licenses Be Cancelled

Cancellation of all business licenses issued to Japanese in British Columbia was urged in a resolution adopted unanimously at a meeting of the Kitsilano Ratepayers' Association on Monday night.

Speedy and effective action to eliminate possibility of sabotage by enemy aliens in coastal regions was demanded by several speakers.

A. E. Craddock, secretary-treasurer of the Associated Property Owners of Vancouver, said the possibility of a Japanese invasion of British Columbia was an argument for reduction of taxation in Vancouver.

An attempted invasion might prove costly in destruction of

life and property in Vancouver and would incur "tremendous expense in restoration and other manners of aid, which the taxpayers would be compelled to provide," Mr. Craddock stated.

"As well as paying for public services, taxpayers would be faced with heavy expense for reconstruction of their own property," he predicted.

Mr. Craddock maintained that as long as provincial civil servants were not receiving a cost-of-living bonus, employees of the city should not claim one.

TAG DAY IN A.R.P.

The city of Vancouver is a non-profit-making institution and the cost-of-living here is less now than it was in 1928, he asserted.

Mr. Craddock criticized citizens for failing to support civic officials' requests for A.R.P. volunteers.

A.R.P. funds might be raised by a special tag day or by a special license to be collected by employers, he suggested.

Ald. G. Worthington reported that a suggestion that No. 4 street cars should be re-routed back to Granville as far as Robson would produce heavy congestion on Robson.

John A. Sutherland, president of the Ratepayers' Association, was in the chair.
