

All Japanese Barred From Holding Land or Growing Crops

May Rent Buildings For Residential Use

Victoria announced further restrictions on British Columbia Japanese today.

The provincial government has been advised from Ottawa that no member of the Japanese race and no Japanese-controlled company may acquire or hold land or grow crops in Canada, effective from February 24.

Buildings used only for residential purposes, however, may be leased for a period up to one year or on a month-to-month basis.

The Minister of Justice, at his discretion, is given authority to issue permits to hold land to Japanese or to employ Japanese to acquire land or growing crops where the opinion that becomes expressed.

Further interpretation is being sought on the status of Japanese.

A score of Japanese residents from a race with the setting sun Monday night as they gathered at CNR depot to bid goodbye to 50 Japanese evacuees en route to Guelph, Alberta.

Each handclasp was accompanied with a nervous staid glance at the west.

As the horizon became deeper red, they said their last goodbyes and hurried away to reach their homes under the starry deadline.

All of the departing Japanese were born in Japan. None was married.

One Japanese scheduled to depart failed to appear. The RCMP will investigate.

Powell Street was deserted by the arrest of 12 residents the previous night, Monday night as the Japanese decided to take no chances.

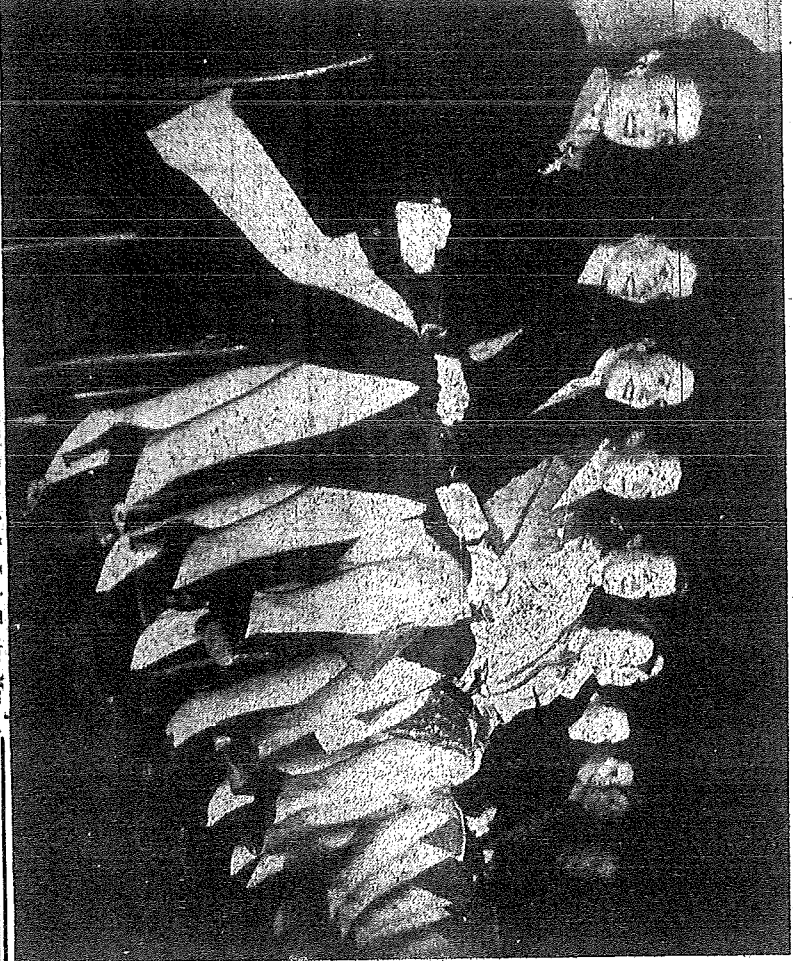

\$8 Millions to Go in Loan

American Can Company Subscribes \$2,500,000

A \$2,500,000 subscription by American Can Co. Ltd., Vancouver, together with several other large items and a good return from the general canvass added \$8,305,080 to the Victory Loan total for B.C. Yukon on Monday.

The total funds at \$83,380,300, leaving \$8,583,380 to be raised by Saturday to reach the quota of \$92 million which campaign officials are hopeful may be considerably over-subscribed.

A determined effort will be made to have the loan largely oversubscribed here and elsewhere throughout Canada, officials state.

"TAKE IT A BILLION"

In the East they have adopted a slogan emanating from the Toronto loan committee: "Let's make it a billion!" With it goes the warning to citizens not to consider their duty done if the Dominion minimum of \$600 million is met.

They point out that Hon. J. T. Mackay, minister of finance, has stated emphatically that all Canadians have an obligation at this time. "The \$600 million figure was set as a minimum objective only, something like the reserve bill at an auction," a spokesman said.

The amount subscribed by the general public on Monday was again disappointing as it was only \$1,217,400 in spite of the very large deposits lying in the hands to the credit of individuals.

The general public in this area (B.C. - Yukon) has purchased bonds to the value of \$20,448,700, coming from 78,825 applications, which means that less than 10 per cent of the population has invested in this year's Victory Bonds.

Monday's applications numbered 8776.

In an effort to secure every possible subscription before the campaign closes on Saturday, some of the divisions whose general canvass has been lagging are re-canvassing their territory in an effort not only to secure every subscription possible, but to obtain increased subscriptions from those in a position to subscribe further.

Two British Columbia divisions went over the top Sunday.

- Vancouver City in general canvass has subscribed \$8,336,800 which is \$4,685,100 short of the general canvass quota.
- Another half million dollars must also come from Vancouver in special subscriptions to meet the special subscriptions quota.
