Evacuated Citizen Japs Can Retain Cars, Guns

OTTAWA. (BUP) - Minister of Justice Louis St. Laurent said in the House of Commons Wednesday that Japanese evacuated from B. C. defence zones were still allowed to possess automobiles, cameras, radios and firearms-providing they are Canadian citizens or naturalized Canadians.

He explained the regulations now in force do not permit confiscation of such articles of Canadian citizens outside the defence zones, but could be taken from Japanese nationals no matter where they resided.

St. Laurent said, however. the regulations might be re-vised to permit authorities to configuate possessions of a Canadian citizen anywhere in the country if it is considered necessary in the interest of mational security.

BANDOENG, Java—(By telephone)—The Japanese invasion forces continued their infiltration efforts during last night and there was local fighting at many places, Dutch military informants said today. Otherwise there was little change in the situation.

LONDON - (Aneta to BUP) Arrangements by which Netherlands East Indies companies can transfer main offices from Batavia to the Netherlands West Indies, have been made by the N. E. I. government, with the consent of the Dutch government in London.

Wednesday Japanese invasion forces expanded their footholds in Java and swarms of their warplanes bombed and machinegunned almost at will crowded highways along which stubborn Dutch, American, Australian and British defenders still were moving up for fierce counterattacks.

Meanwhile, Dutch authorities announced that demolition of all major installations in the island had been completed.

Most of the enemy advances were limited to infiltrations by small groups of snipers, some of whom regained part of the 71mile sector which the Allied forces cleared Tuesday.

The only major battle reported was for possession of Soebang, 26 miles northeast of Bandoeng and about 40 miles southwest of the Japanese landing point near Indramajoe.
