

# Monday Set as Deadline for Turning in Lap Cars, Radios, Cameras

## HASTINGS PARK TO BE DEPT

All persons of Japanese race must surrender motor vehicles, radios and cameras at two depots set up in the city, under orders issued by the R.C.M.P.

Delivery of cars and other banned articles will start at 9 a.m. Monday.

Vehicles - including automobiles, trucks, trailers and motor cycles - must be delivered to R.C.M.P. at Hastings Park.

Radio receiving sets and cameras are to be delivered to the R. C. M. P. barracks, Thirty-third and Heather.

### AREAS AFFECTED.

The order applies to Japanese in the southern portion of the restricted area, but not to Vancouver Island and Gulf Islands. Included is the Lower Fraser Valley, Greater Vancouver, North Vancouver and West Vancouver, West Westminster, outlying towns such as Burnaby, Abbotsford, Chilliwack, Mission, Hammond and Haney.

It is pointed out by the R. C. M. P. that although existing orders and previous orders set forth that Japanese must surrender firearms and automobiles, these were long ago seized under Defense of Canada Regulations. Although the new regulations do not require that radio transmitters be delivered, it has been illegal for some time to possess or operate a transmitter.

### POLICE TO BE LENIENT.

City police have agreed, at the request of Col. C. Hill, commander of the R.C.M.P., not to molest Japanese driving cars, to the surrender depots on Monday. Most of the Japanese cars will be without 1942 licenses.

Furthermore, the orders do not state that Japanese must not drive them. But on both counts, the city police will be lenient, in order to permit delivery of some 1500 to 2000 vehicles to the R.C.M.P.

### DOCTORS EXEMPTED.

Japanese are requested by Colonel Hill to bring their own car to the surrender depot when delivering the cars, all documents relating to registry and operation of motor vehicles and copies of the license slip issued annually with license plates, copies of title and conditional sales agreements.

The order does not apply to the foreign Japanese who will continue to operate their vehicles at all hours while giving professional services.

### William Anderson On Trial in Seattle

William Ewald Anderson, secretary of the South Washington district International Woodworkers of America (I.W.O.A.), was denied entry into Canada at an immigration hearing in Vancouver in August, 1935, as he tried to enter Seattle for alleged illegal entry into the United States.

I.W.O.A. officials here who have been questioned because, as a result, he lived in Canada a lengthy period.

### Woman Is Sentenced For Dangerous Driving

A fine of \$100 or a month in jail was handed down in City Police Court today to Mrs. Genevieve M. Perry, 4153 Perry, charged with dangerous driving. Mrs. Perry's license was ordered suspended for one year by Magistrate McIntyre. The charge was laid following a collision involving an auto driven by the accused and another machine in the 600 block, Seymour, on February 20.

### Presume Death

On the petition of Charles Mann, marine worker, 1750 Davie, Mr. Justice Manish in Provincial Court chambers today made an order presuming the death of Ezzelle Mann, whom he married in Sydney, Australia, in 1935 and has not heard of for 37 years. Stanley Anderson appeared for the husband.

### Japanese Released

An elderly Japanese arrested at a single mill late Thursday night, under curfew regulations, was released this morning when he appeared in City Police Court. The man explained that he worked at the mill from 3 p.m. until midnight and slept in the mill until morning.

### Dismiss Appeal

The Court of Appeal today dismissed an appeal of John James O'Connor from conviction for stealing a bolt of silk and a sentence of two years imprisonment imposed by Magistrate H. S. Wood. The silk was stolen from Saba Brothers Ltd. on February 5 last. L. S. M. DuMoulin appeared for the crown.

Vancouver city over-subscribed its quota of \$28,250,000 by \$1,000,000 in the Victory Loan drive. To celebrate the occasion, the V-Girl presented a red-white-and-blue pennant to Mayor Cornett in a picturesque ceremony on the steps of the City Hall, dignified by Victory Loan officials and five city and air force units.

"We hope to have exceeded our quota by 10 per cent, when the campaign closes Saturday night," said C. Lyall Fraser, organizer of Vancouver division.

SECOND PENNANT. "If we are fortunate enough to go over our quota, Vancouver city will receive a second honor pennant.

The pennant so far includes corporations and special names, is set at 25 per cent, would require a very special effort by small investors throughout the city."
