All cars owned by persons Japanese race living on Vancou-ver Island must be turned in to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police at the Willows Exhibition Grounds by sunset Thursday.

The convoy will consist of Japanese cars and trucks with 1941 licenses. Japanese owners of cars with 1942 licenses will proon their own initiative. is believed some of them will arrive today. It is estimated there will be approximately 75 cars in the convoy.

The caravan of Japanese cars is being-arranged by the B.C. Police, who will provide the escort. The cars will be driven by the owners themselves, who will have to re-turn to their homes at their own
