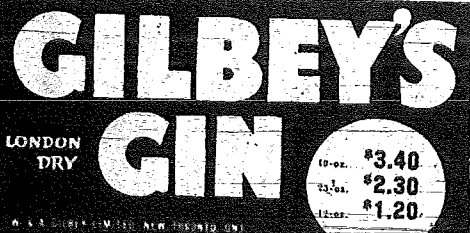

been settled, and that he hoped it would be agreeable to the city.

However, Mayor Andrew McGavin of Victoria said he considered the amount set by the commission to be too low.

"By its original order," the Mayor commented, "the commission set the price of water at 6.75 cents per 1,000 gallons. By appeal from that finding, the city has had the price increased by over half a cent per 1,000 gallons—but although this is a substantial victory for the city, both before the courts and the Public Utilities Commission, I feel it is still an insufficient amount for Oak Bay to pay."

GIVES REASONS

Mr. McGavin added that the "real difference" between the city's calculations and the findings of the commission is in the amount allowed for Smith's Hill reservoir as a standby.

"The city," he said, "claims that the reservoir is, at all times, as beneficial to Oak Bay and all other users of water outside Victoria as it is to the city itself, but the commission has seen fit to allow only 15 per cent of the annual charges of this reservoir, claiming that the other 85 per cent is only of benefit to Victoria."

It was intimated that the possibility of a further appeal was a matter which might be considered by the water board, though yesterday this prospect had not been discussed at the City Hall.

**MOTOR STORES
HAVE HOLIDAY**

Exempting Service Stations, Motor Trade Will Participate in Weekly Closing

Commencing on March 21, shops in Greater Victoria dealing with automobile repairing, reconditioning or painting, together with wholesale parts stores and new-car showrooms will be closed at 1 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, apart from their service station facilities.

This was provided yesterday by a Provincial order in council dealing with provisions and exemptions under the Weekly Half-Holiday Act and applying to the area confined within Victoria, Oak Bay, Saanich and Esquimalt municipalities.

Special provision was made in the case of service stations which may be part of such shops, and which will continue as before, as will towing and emergency services, as well as the storage of automobiles.

**TORPEDOES STRIKE
NEWFOUNDLAND SHORE**

HALIFAX, March 19 (CP).—A Halifax soldier, home on leave, said today two torpedoes, aimed by a Nazi submarine at a merchant ship, missed their mark and exploded on the rocky coast of Newfoundland.

Broken rock was the only damage caused by the explosives, he said, adding the incident occurred quite close to his battery.

City & District

City Temperatures—Maximum and minimum temperatures recorded yesterday at the Dominion Meteorological Observatory on Gonzales Hill were 51 and 37 degrees, respectively. The maximum temperature observed on the grounds of the Strathcona Hotel was 51 degrees and the minimum 34 degrees.

Poll Tax Unpaid—Three persons were fined \$5 and \$1 costs each yesterday in city police court for failure to pay their 1941 poll tax. One was fined \$2 and \$1 costs for not paying road tax.

To Meet Commission—Hon. R. W. Bruhn left yesterday for Vancouver, where he will meet the British Columbia Security Commission and other bodies in connection with highway work planned in the Interior.

Endorse Motion—Cumberland and Courtenay have endorsed a resolution of the City Council calling for public ownership and control in Peace River oil drilling operations, according to letters received at the City Hall yesterday.

Commission to Sit—The Public Utilities Commission will sit at Vancouver on Monday to hear the application of the B.C.E.R. Company Ltd. for leave to add twenty street cars in the Mainland city, Dr. W. A. Carrothers, chairman, announced yesterday. The hearing will be held at the Motor Carriers Branch in Vancouver.

Traffic Violations—Six persons were fined \$2.50 each in city police court yesterday for infractions of city parking laws. One person was fined \$10 for driving more than thirty miles an hour, two were fined \$3 for not having drivers' licences, and one other was fined \$5 for failure to stop at a stop sign.

Extend Island Park—The Provincial Government added ninety-three acres of adjoining forest land to Stamp Falls Park yesterday by order in council. Weekly Saturday afternoon closing for a section of the automobile trade was ratified, as announced by the trade itself. North Vancouver District was empowered to dispose of \$900 worth of tax reverted lands in other orders.

Nine Remanded—Nine cases were remanded in city police court yesterday by Magistrate Henry C. Hall. Three persons were charged with dangerous driving, one with being intoxicated while in control of a car, and another with attempt to steal a car. One case was under the Mental Hospitals Act, and another for failure to pay road tax.

Many Are Fined—Five motorists who were convicted of speeding through zoned areas were fined \$10 apiece by Magistrate H. C. Hall in Saanich police court yesterday. Two who drove without first obtaining drivers' licences were fined \$5 apiece, and the same fine was levied upon a motorist who failed to stop at a stop sign. Two persons who failed to pay their road and poll taxes were charged \$2.50 each for the poll and \$1 for the road taxes, and in addition fined \$1 each.

Ambulance Service—In a letter received yesterday at the City Hall the Victoria and District Trades and Labor Council suggested a unified ambulance service for the city and surrounding municipalities. In asking if any efforts have been made to provide such a service, the council stated, "We are making this inquiry because it has been drawn to our attention that on several occasions injured persons have been left to lie on the street for more or less lengthy periods while inquiries are made as to what municipality shall bear the cost of ambulance service."

Sugar Is Seized—While no prosecutions were taken, Provincial Police, acting on the information of local authorities, seized three sacks of sugar over rationing allotments, found in Japanese homes in the Hillcrest area, it was reported yesterday. Corporal S. Service, and Constables Ross and Deane investigated the complaint, found two sacks of 700 pounds at the home of Mrs. M. Kazou, and a 100-pound Douglas Street, Phone E6014.

**CORONER'S JURY
RETURNS VERDICT**

Members Find Death of Mrs. D'Arcy Martin at 1512 Vining Street Due to Accident

A verdict of accidental death was returned by a coroner's jury under Dr. E. C. Hart at McCall Brothers' Funeral Chapel yesterday morning after investigating circumstances surrounding the death of Mrs. D'Arcy at 1512 Vining Street. She was found lying dead in the hall of her home on Tuesday.

Members of the jury were John W. Kenyon (foreman), Ralph Bagley, Clyde Paulson, James E. Talbot, Arthur R. Driver and Sybil W. Wallis.

Fire Chief Alex Munroe, the first witness, stated he found the remains in the hall near a bedroom at 9:15 o'clock Tuesday morning. He noticed a mattress and bedding had been consumed by fire, rugs and the floor scorched, and two other rooms badly discolored by smoke.

Dr. Gordon A. McCurdy, who performed a post-mortem examination, said he noticed the body covered with a sticky brown deposit from smoke. In the doctor's opinion death had been caused by asphyxia from smoke and carbon monoxide poisoning.

Constable Robert Davidson told of finding the front and rear doors of the house locked and a strong smell of stale smoke throughout the building.
