of these two districts want a total war effort. Therefore I ask you for a strong yes vote on the plebiscite to strengthen what I might say in support of a total war effort, not just to get the men to meet the enemy on our shores, but to meet him wherever we can find him. Our job is to find him, defeat him and follow him to Berlin, Rome and Tokyo.

"A total war effort is our only hope if we wish to continue as a free people. The world is being divided and subjugated and free people, unfortunately, are falling under the domination of aggressors. The subjugated areas have grown in direct relation to the swiftness and brutality of our enemies' attacks. Greater and greater portions of the continents are being affected, with the war machine still rolling and headed in our direction.

"With the enemy at our very gates, I appeal to you to forget all else than the unity of our people. Deal with this matter first, with others at a later time in the usual way.

"Let those of us answer as we must for our sins of omission and commission, but reserve our judgment on those sins now.

"Remember, the perfect plan is the one which has never been put to the test. Under test, it might reveal weaknesses.

"If the plebiscite is not to your mind, the ideal scheme, give it your support at least so that the country may find unity in this practical and effective means of marshaling our forces for the task before us."

**Jap Cars Keep Custodian Busy**

Although Japanese try hard to forget about their motor vehicles which they sold or turned in on March 13, the representative of the custodian in Victoria, H. G. Hinton, can't forget about these cars.

In the cattle building at the Willows, 39 former Japanese-owned motor vehicles of all kinds—motorcycles, cars, trucks, lumber carriers—rest bumper to bumper.

No orders have been received to dispose of them.

Gasoline and oil was drained from the tanks of the cars to remove the fire menace but Mr. Hinton says, the removal of gas and oil is in a sense a menace, for should the cars be threatened by fire, it would be difficult to move them.

To remove all danger of the cars freezing, water was drained from the radiators when they were registered by the R.C.M.P. The motor vehicles are under R.C.M.P. guard.

To prevent deterioration of the tires, a mechanic, who weekly checks over the cars, sees the tires are fully inflated.

The authorities are not the only worry of Mr. Hinton. As representative of the custodian, he is also responsible for Japanese property at West Coast points where the Japanese have been evacuated.
