Two-thirds of Requirements Filled; Several Hundred Gillnetters Still to Be Released By Committee

Neil McLean, fish products administrator, that although fresh salmon is a seasonal product and supplies of it vary from time to time, the price will not be allowed to increase over that of 1841. 741. The order stipulates that no pro

The order stipulates that no pro-cessor, wholesaler or retailer will be allowed to sell any fresh caught salmon at a price greater than that obtained by him in the corresponding month of 1941 for the same kind, brand, grade or quality of product.

Vancouver fish dealers will not hazard any guess on the effect of the new order on prices of salmon to the consumer.

Fix Ontario **Beet Prices**

TORONTO, April 18.—Ontario Farm Products Control Board's order, setting the price of sugar beets for this year, has been ap-proved by the Wartime Prices proved by the Wand Trade Board.

In making the announcement, G. F. Perkin, chairman of the Ontario Board, issued an appeal to the growers to plant up to 40,000 acres this year to help 40,000 acres this year to help meet the sugar shortage in Can

Under the board's order, issued two weeks ago, the price of 16 percent sugar content beets delivered at the factory is set at \$8.20 a ton, an increase of \$1.30 a ton above the prevailing price in 1941. Prices for other grades are up in proportion.

One provision in the order is that the growers are to patticlpate in any increase in the price of sugar, dried beet pulp or molasses over the present levels.

Last year the acreage dropped to 28,000 from the 38,000 plunted in 1940, the reduction being precipitated by a cut in price. Under the board's order, issued
