

would transform ritzy fairways into parade grounds for soldiers in training.

This radical proposal was advanced by Stanley Thompson, of Toronto, golf architect and a former champion himself.

He gave as his view that exclusive clubhouses could be used as military training headquarters.

"It wouldn't hurt the courses at all," Mr. Thompson said in an interview. "With reasonable care, top dressing and judicious fertilizing, they could be restored three months after the war ended."

DESIGNED COURSES Mr. Thompson ought to know He has designed ninety-six of the most picturesque courses in the country, including Banff Springs, Alta., and Capilano in Vancouver.

His shut-down plan for golf had several other features he believed would help the war effort.

"Approximately \$60,000,000 is invested today in courses, clubhouses, land and equipment," the architect said. "It takes several million more each year for labor and material to keep the courses running."

"About one-third of these could comfortably close down for the duration. If the extra money went to the Government, it would buy a lot of war machines. Thousands of
