

Cancellation of All Japanese Licenses Urged

Move to 'Keep Nipponese Under Ban 'After War'

Moves to cancel trade licenses of all Japanese merchants still in Vancouver and to ask the Legislature for authority to prevent their re-admittance into local business after the war will be made next Tuesday in civic committee.

These steps were promulgated Monday by H. D. Wilson after the City Council heard an allegedly "evasive" letter from Hon. Humphrey Mitchell, federal Minister of Labor.

Anger flared immediately when council heard an application for a membership on the B. C. Security Commission was being tacitly refused. Britain Restricts Cafe Prices

Ceiling on Food, Gin and Dancing

LONDON, May 12.—Food minister Lord Woolton announced today that beginning June 1 the price of restaurant meals would be limited to five shillings (about \$1.10), and the number of courses to three.

He said the House of Lords that a government order would prohibit the serving of fish game and poultry by restaurants on certain days "to allow domestic consumption" (housewives) to purchase a reasonable share of the supplies available.

In addition to establishing a ceiling on prices of meals, the order also restricts charges for dancing floor shows and service which can be added to the bill. Charges for whisky, gin and

there are also restricted when they are added to the bill. Prices of whisky and gin supplied with meals cannot exceed five shillings and three shillings respectively, respectively. A stilling will be the limit for half a pint of beer, and one shilling and sixpence for a bottle. Maximum charge for dancing and floor show, either or both will be half a crown.
