Whaling Vessels Make Port After Nightmare Trip

LONDON, May 13 (CP).—A group of whalers which Britain has used for years for mine-sweeping has arrived at the Soviet supply port of Murmansk for service with the British Fleet, the Ministry of Information said last night. The whalers were handed over to the Russians at the Arctic port after an eight-day British officer called "a nightmare trip" through ice formations, mists, gales, floating mine fields and bombing attacks. The officer said steam hoses were useless against the ice formations and four feet thick on the decks and the wheelhouse of his ship. "Finally we had to abandon our ship and turn and run before the ice so that all hands could get to safety," he added. "We cleared the ice in an hour. It was as hard as concrete."

VICTORIAN MACHINISTS OF VANCOUVER REFUSE TO ASSIST IN PROGRAMME

VANCOUVER, May 13 (CP).—The Victorian Machinists' Union has declined to maintain its stand against acceptance of the continuing production programme introduced this month in British Columbia shipyards, a spokesman for the union said today. The union's other members in the yards have accepted the programme, which provides for a seven-day week on a staggered system with elimination of overtime for week-end work. Only the machinists and blacksmiths in Vancouver yards have refused to operate. Machinists in Victoria yards yesterday announced their intention of operating in the plan.

SURVIVORS OF SHIP LANDED

United States Merchant Vessel Torpedoed Off West Coast of Africa

NORFOLK, Va., May 13 (AP).—Forty-four survivors, including an eight-man navy-gun crew, of a medium-sized American merchant ship torpedoed off the west coast of Africa early in April, were landed at Norfolk May 9 by a passenger vessel, which also brought missionaries and other Americans from Africa. No members of the regular crew or the gun-crew were lost, but nine of a sixty-five-man crew of African longshoremen were killed in the attack and another died en route to port, the Navy disclosed in announcing the slinking today. Captain Turllet G. Selness of Brooklyn, N.Y., told naval officers here that his ship was struck at night by one torpedo, but did not sink immediately. The crew was ordered to lower the lifeboats in the event there should be another attack. A rescue vessel took the survivors aboard and remained in the vicinity. The next day Captain Selness and several crewmen boarded the torpedoed ship and inspected it. An attempt was made to tow her to a nearby harbor, the captain related, but the water was coming in too fast to make any headway and the crew was ordered to abandon ship. When last seen the stricken craft was partly under water with only part of her deck and stern showing.

Dismiss Illegal Strike Charges Against Workers

KINGSTON, Ont., May 13 (CP).—Charges of striking illegally laid against five employees of the Kingston Shipbuilding Company following a strike which ended last April 22 were dismissed here today. Charged were W. E. Blair, John Montgomery, Joseph Sharpe, James Rice and W. Bradley. The strike was called April 20 in sympathy with a strike at Midland, Ont., shipyards. When settlement was reached in the Midland strike the Kingston strikers returned to work. J. L. Cohen, defence counsel, argued today that there was no evidence of dispute between the workers and the company and it would be impossible to register a conviction with no evidence of dispute. The company had issued a statement at the time of the strike saying it had no dispute with the workers.

Dispose of More Than 800 Former Japanese Boats

VANCOUVER, May 13 (CP).—More than 800 fishing vessels, formerly operated by Japanese in British Columbia waters and interned when Japan entered the war, have been transferred to white fishermen of the Royal Canadian Navy by the disposal committee handling their sale. It was announced here today by A. E. McMaster, committee manager. More than 700 of the craft are now back in commercial fishing. The others will be used for naval or other Government purposes. More than 400 vessels have still to be disposed of.

SUN CHARIOT HEADS FIELD

NEWMARKET, England, May 13 (CP).—The King's stable completed a race double at Newmarket today when Sun Chariot won the One Thousand Guineaes Stake, for three-year-old fillies, after the Royal colt Big Game took the Two Thousand Guineaes classic yesterday. Sun Chariot was the even money favorite. It was the first time since 1902 that one stable had won both events and the first time Royal colts ever won both.
