**Farris Honored By Political, Business Leaders**

**Victory 'Assured' For Free Peoples---Chief Justice**

"We may face reverses; there is a long and hard road ahead, but now victory is assured."

Surrounded by nearly 200 intimate friends, showered with gifts, praised and congratulated by eloquent addresses from the leaders of the community, Chief Justice Wendell B. Farris made this serious statement Friday night at a banquet honoring his elevation to the position of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of British Columbia.

Prominent in many fields, in politics and in business, the chief justice is the first to admit that he is not noted as a public speaker. But on this occasion which paid him such a high

tribute, he was impressive in an address which covered the serious phase of world conditions today and the future facing the world after the war.

Warning against over-optimism, he never-the-less declared that, given leadership by Britain's stand following the collapse of France, the free peoples of the world would fight on inexorably until victory was gained.

In the future he saw scientific and manufacturing progress never yet equalled. He visualized a world in which capitalism still had its place, but would be shorn of all monopolistic tendencies to provide for the welfare and security of all.

The chief justice and the office he represents, were eulogized in sincere remarks by G. G. McGeer, K.C., M.P., who proposed a toast to him, and by Major Harold Brown, eloquent chairman of the evening.

Concrete tributes, too, came in the form of several presenta-

tions made to the chief justice.

From those present a valuable silver engraved tray was presented by Major Austin C. Taylor, who referred to the personal sacrifices the chief justice had made in accepting judicial duties.

Indicative of these sacrifices were two other presentations made by Brenton S. Brown and A. D. Anderson. Mr. Brown presented a handsome desk set, with inkwell cap and pen made entirely of gold from Hedley Mascot Gold Mines Ltd., of which the chief justice was for many years president, and as Mr. Brown put it, "guiding influence."

On behalf of the board of directors of Harrison Hot Springs Hotel, of which the chief justice was also a member for many years, Mr. Anderson presented a large, engraved silver tray.

From prominent citizens throughout Canada, Maj. Brown read a sheaf of telegrams congratulating the chief justice on his appointment.
