VICTORIA OFFICER'S ESCAPE

Backstroke Is Bombproof

(By Canadian Press.) VICTORIA, Oct. 3.—Lieut. George Gregory said he survived the recent sinking of the corvette H.M.C.S. Charlotte because he was swimming on his back when the depth charges blew up. He came home Wednesday after being released from hospital in the east, and is visiting his mother, Mrs. F. B. Gregory, here.

"The corvette sank in three minutes after being torpedoed aft and in the boiler-room, and

I leaped into the sea when the lifeboats ropes got jammed and we were unable to launch it," said Lieut. Gregory.

After swimming awhile Lieut. Gregory turned over on his back "to take it easier" and then the depth charges exploded. "Two men nearby were killed while 'luckily' I got away with a dose of concussion."

"They were taking the breast stroke," Lieut. Gregory said, "and got the full force of the blast in their stomachs. A cigarette case I carried in my hip pocket was smashed flat by the impact of the exploding charges."

Local Boards Won't Handle Gasoline, Tires

Representatives of agriculture, trade and industry, labor, the professions and women's organization will sit on local ration boards under the chairmanship of the mayor and reeve of each community in Canada, according to word received from Ottawa.

Local boards, formation of which was announced earlier this week, will possess full knowledge of local conditions and will be able to deal with local rationing problems.

They will deal only with food and other personal items that may be rationed in the future and will not handle rationing of gasoline, tires or other industrial items. Members will serve on a voluntary basis.

Jap Farms Neglected, Says Charge

CHILLIWACK, Oct. 3.—(CP)—Associated Boards of Trade of British Columbia, meeting in quarterly session here yesterday, agreed to appoint a committee to bring in a full report on former Japanese-owned farms at the next meeting next December at Mission, after hearing charges some properties had been neglected by new owners or lessors.

The meeting also endorsed a proposal by the Delta Board of Trade requesting the Provincial Government to reduce private motor vehicle licenses to a flat rate of \$10 per annum.

The question of settlement of farmers on Japanese berry farms in the lower Fraser Valley was brought up by Lang Sands, Abbotsford, who asserted "every obstruction possible to prevent settlement was made, while Mennonites, through some mysterious channel, procured leases overnight."

L. R. Wilson, Mission, said a general audit of transactions was taking place before any more settlers would be granted yearly leases. He said many settlers who took over Japanese berry farms this summer knew little about berry farming and exploited crops.

In some cases little or no tilling had been done, Mr. Wilson said, and such farms were ruined for some time to come.

"Taking over of these farms now is not a matter for the custodian (of enemy property), but for the Soldiers' Settlement Board," he declared. "Such farms taken over by Mennonites and Doukhobors is infinitely worse than the Japanese owners."

Mr. Wilson declared that through lack of proper care next year's strawberry crop will not exceed 75 per cent of this year's harvest.

H. Day, Abbotsford, asked that the uses of these lands be held for postwar rehabilitation.

Tom Robertson of Chilliwack, president, presided over the meeting.
