Question Legality

JAPS CONTEST PROPERTY SALE

Plans to contest the legality of the government's liquidation of Japanese-owned property within the Pacific Coast defense area are being laid by the Japanese Property Owners' Association, according to reports from Japanese camps at Tashme and Kaslo.

Registration and filing of legal descriptions of property by all evacuees interested in preserving their rights of ownership is being carried out.

Solicitors for the Japanese, report they have received several completed forms from the Japanese property owners and expect the remainder of the registration forms to arrive from the interior late this week.

"I intend to take action and contest the legality of the proposed sale," J. A. MacLennan, solicitor, said today.

EXPECT ADVERTISEMENTS.

MacLennan said he had expected advertisements announcing the sale of the properties a week or 10 days ago.

"For some reason, there has been a delay on the government's part. Various government officials met in Winnipeg this week and we can expect to have definite word on the proposed sale shortly."

Hope is expressed that arrangements can be made between the solicitors and the custodian's office to establish the legality of the sale before the policy is put into effect.
