"Society must meet in full its obligation to make available to all its members at least the min-imum. adequate nutrition" the President said in a message to the conference's opening session.

Vancouver, New Westminster and District Trades and Labor Council Tuesday night instructed its secretary to write Hon. Hum-phrey Mitchell, correcting the labor minister's erroneous im-pression the council had asked a commission to "supervise the aircraft industry in British Co-lumbia."

The council recently endorsed The council recently endorsed a request from the Aeronautical Mechanics Lodge No. 756, asking appointment of a commission to investigate, not supervise, the industry here in order to correct some of the grievances.

Noting that every effort should be bent on war production, Mr. Mitchell wrote that it "should not be necessary to set up a commission to supervise the aircraft industry. In British Columbia."

Granting of such a request, he said, would lead to similar requests all over the country, leading to "a most unnecessary situation."

"The officers of the Welders asked the executive board of the ABWC to reorganize the local forthem and direct them in their ultimate objective of being an All-Canadian Welders and Burners' Union, with their own autonomy, their own finances and their own bylaws and constitution," the pamphlet stated.

Warning of the danger if a society entered the British Columbia labor field, the executive declared the Federation of United Welders, Cutters and Helpers, recently chartered under the Societies' Act at Victoria, is not a union.

"The department of labor does not recognize any society as a labor corealization."
