To Be Held For Distribution Until After War

OTTAWA, June 19,-(CP)-State Secretary McLarty announced Friday night that 769 parcels of farm land in the Fraser Valley area of British Columbia, formerly owned by Japanese, have been sold to the director of the Veterans' Land Act for future disposition to British Columbia men now in the armed forces.

Proceeds of the sale will be credited to the accounts of the former Japanese owners. It was negotiated by Mr. McLarty, as custodian of enemy property, on the recommendation of the advisory committee on rural proportions to the property of the second of the se erty set up under Judge White-side of New Westminster, B. C.

The owners of the land have been evacuated from the pro-tected areas of British Colum-bia, of which the Fraser Valley is part.

Administration of the tracts will be transferred to the provincial supervisor under the Veterans' Land Act, at Van-

The director of the Land Act, Gordon Murchison, said in a statement that not all the parcels of land are "of themselves suitable for veteran settle-

"In some cases subdivision "In some cases subdivision may be undertaken. In others, it may be advisable to consolidate two or more parcels into one unit. In many cases it will be necessary to undertake extensive alterations to existing buildings or the erection of new homes of modestion of new homes of modesting new homes new how tion of new homes of modest size but of enduring construc-tion. The scarcity of building materials and expert labor at the present time are factors which make it necessary to postpone such a building program until conditions are more favorable."

Meanwhile, he said, local administration of these lands will come under I. T. Barnet, pro-vincial superintendent, Veterans' Land Act and Soldier Settlement, at Vancouver. Annual taxes levied by the local authorities will be paid in accordance with the provisions of the Veterans' Land Act,

Charlie Palmer, secretary of the Greater Vancouver Canadian Legion, said here Friday that the land will be held until after the war for disposition among B. C. veterans of this
