KAMLOOPS, July 16.—As a result of their Dominion Day stampede, the Kinsmen Club of Kamloops expect to have close to \$4000 available for their Milk for Britain Fund. In addition they have allocated \$500 to the Kamloops Civilian Auxiliary, the Corvette Kamloops and the Moose Squadron of the RCAF.

School Conditions Declared 'Disgrace'

VICTORIA, July 16.—(CP) — When the inquiry into Saanich school affairs was resumed by Judge J. O. Wilson of Ashcroft yesterday, H. A. Beckwith, counsel for Dr. J. Morris Thomas, principal of Mount View High School, contended the report of former Trustees Frank L. Tupman and J. R. L. Burridge, concerning conditions at the high school, contained "many exaggerations and inaccuracies."

Mr. Beckwith took exception to phrases such as "Incredibly beastly and filthy conditions," and also objected to references to "morale" and the "moral tone" which he thought might imply immorality or immoral conduct on the part of the students.

Mr. Tupman, resuming his testimony, replied that he had

never questioned, even by inference, the morality of students, but that he felt, and still feels, that the "morale" of school spirit as a whole had suffered by reason of the conditions complained of in the report.

"DISGRACE TO ANY SCHOOL" Following Mr. Tupman to the stand, Mr. Burridge told of school lockers "from which garments were 'hanging halfway out.'" "Lavatory conditions, he said, were "unbelievable."

The school auditorium and "activity" room were "a disgrace to any school," he said. Sinks in the chemical room were littered with empty match boxes, paper and debris, expensive equipment was not adequately protected, poisonous chemicals were left exposed and a fire door in the furnace room was "out of kilter," Mr. Burridge testified.

DRESSING ROOM "LITTER" John Gough, school inspector, corroborated many of the findings in the report as to the state of school property.

He also spoke of a women's dressing room used by teachers in which, he testified, there was a considerable litter of personal belongings.

Court Battle Looms Over Jap Property

Final instructions have been received by J. Arthur MacLennan, Vancouver barrister, to start legal proceedings to halt the custodian's sale of Japanese-owned property in Vancouver.

Mr. MacLennan told The Vancouver Sun today that he will send tomorrow or Monday three petitions to Hon. Norman McFarly, secretary of state, for the right to sue the government in the exchequer court.

These will be in the names of a Japanese national, a naturalized Japanese and a Canadian-born Japanese.

If leave is granted by the Secretary of State, the actions will be launched immediately in the exchequer court in Ottawa and may be tried there or at the fall sitting of that tribunal in Vancouver in September.

SERIES OF QUESTIONS

Accompanying the petitions of right, will be a suggestion from Mr. MacLennan that the government place the whole matter before the exchequer court in a series of questions.

It is his contention that the custodian is not entitled to consider himself as the owner of the Japanese property and, therefore, has no authority to sell it.

ARP Apparatus Made of Scrap

KAMLOOPS, July 16.—Making use of an old garage wrecker and various odds and ends, two members of the Kamloops fire department, Edgar Murray and M. G. Hall, have just completed a motorized fire-fighting unit for the local ARP organization.

The ARP some time ago received a motor-driven pump, mounted on a small trailer. This has been built into the new unit, together with rucks for the hose, and places for other items of fire-fighting equipment. The engine job has been neatly finished and painted and is ready to take its place in ARP practices—and if need be, do a real job, when called upon.

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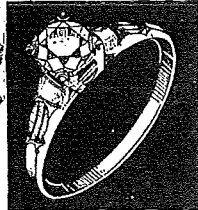

500 U-Boat Tally Sheets to Fill

Kiwanis Club members at their luncheon on Thursday filled three more depth charge tally sheets, making a total of six filled sheets as their contribution to the current "Stamp-Out-the-U-Boat" drive for sale of war savings stamps.

Last week Kiwanis members filled three sheets, each representing \$90 in stamps, or the cost of one depth charge. On Thursday two were filled quickly with stamps furnished by "Miss Canada" girls. A start was made on a third, an da Kiwanian offered to complete it, giving his blank cheque, which later was filled out for \$65.

War finance committee officials in charge of the Vancouver drive, with its objective of 600 depth charges, state that there is still a long way to go as not many more than 100 tally sheets have so far been completed.

Many have been taken up by private individuals, the largest

single individual contribution so far being that of Jack Pattison of Pacific Athletic Club, who took stamps to the value of \$450 — enough for five depth charges.

Two weeks remain in the Vancouver drive, and it will require that citizens buy war savings stamps to the value of \$2500 daily to reach the objective.

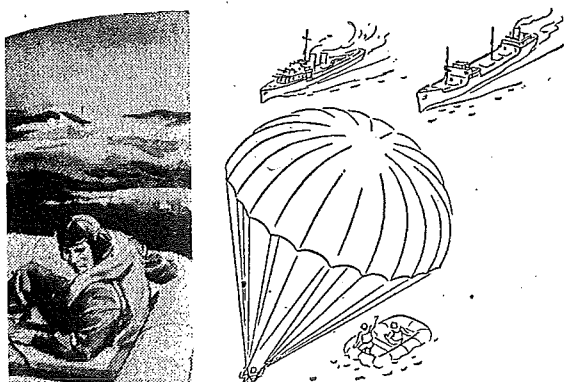
