Include All Unions

MAY OPEN CASE HERE

NEW SHIPYARD MEET PLANNED Counsel for Japanese Plans To Speed Property Sale Test

All trade unions of the west coast operating in any shipyard and allied industry will be invited to participate in another shipyard conference to be held within 30 days. This decision was reached at the second session of the B. C. Shipyard Union Conference which opened in the Holden Hall on Monday. The meetings continue today.

A spokesman for the delegates said that "regardless of possible Canadian Congress of Labor federations of an organic nature, proposed or indicated at the last convention, the B. C. Shipyard Union Conference will be broadened and spread to include all groups in the province.

SOCIAL SIGNIFICANCE.

"It was felt that the social significance of the conference is a contribution to unionism and the people at large while any organic federation of C.C.L. unions would deal primarily with wages and working conditions.

Preparing for post-war readjustments, delegates discussed labor-management production committee work, housing, charities, social services and union agreements.

The delegates included representatives from Vancouver, Victoria and Prince Rupert. C. Hayes, Victoria, occupied the chair. Thomas G. MacKenzie is secretary.

Efforts to put labor-management committees to work in the shipyards were discussed at length. It was felt that the principle should be broadened for post-war planning.

MAY BUY HOMES.

The delegates considered regulations of War-time Housing Ltd. and said that the arrangements differed in Vancouver, Victoria and Prince Rupert.

Action against the Federal Government by evacuee Japanese owners of property which is now being sold under compulsory order may be taken in Vancouver courts, J. A. MacLennan, counsel for the protesting Japanese, said today.

Mr. MacLennan said he will start proceedings here unless he receives an answer from the secretary of state in Ottawa to his application for leave to sue

the Federal Government.

"The applications were made some time ago but so far there has been no answer," he said.

"I'm going to wire the secretary of state and if there is no suitable answer to that I'll have to start proceedings in our own courts."

POSSIBLE STEPS.

Mr. MacLennan declined to state at this time just how he would proceed on a test case to determine the validity of the federal order-in-council which gives the custodian power to sell Japanese property.

Since it is necessary to obtain permission from the secretary of state to sue the government, and since that permission has not yet been granted, it is possible that preliminary action might be started by means of a suit against a purchaser having obtained a parcel of Japanese property as a result of the federal order.

Meanwhile, Japanese who own property threatened by compulsory sale, and who are now located in interior detainment camps, are continuing their efforts to raise money for which to fight the order.
