Property Sale Said Unlawful

Mr. MacLennan said he considered the removal of the Japanese from the B.C. coastal area a war measure which was "well taken," but the property they had left should be available to them when the "protected area" of the Japanese removed and restrictions were removed and the Japanese allowed to return.

"The government had a duty to step in and protect the property, but that is as far as it goes," he said.

CONTRACT IMPLIED

Forms signed by the Japanese when they turned the property over to the custodian and the transfer was voluntary and it implied a contract with the Crown.

"The property is rented at a profit and there is no necessity for its sale," he said. "It doesn't add one iota to the war effort."
