Begin Salvage Of U.S. Blimp

NANAIMO, July 3 (CP)—United States naval engineers have begun the task of salvaging a \$500,000 blimp wrecked more than 20 miles inland from here three weeks ago.

The blimp, which crashed, killing an airman, was used for an R.C.A.F. search for an enemy submarine which crashed, killing an airman.

The blimp was caught by a down draft and sucked into a canyon, where it was left hanging in a tangle.

1,000 Laid Off At Lapointe Pier

VANCOUVER, July 3 (CP)—Fully 1,000 of the workers at Lapointe Pier shipyard here have been laid off recently and many employees will have to leave the yard unless new contracts are secured.

The official explained the present program of shutting down the yard was being completed. Nearly 1,000 men and women are still employed at the yard and virtually all would have to be laid off unless new orders were received.

Work at Lapointe Pier was of a temporary nature, said Major Bruce, an official of the Army's Canadian Building Workers of Canada, the workers' union, but work may be resumed later.

The layoffs do not necessarily mean a slackening of work at other Vancouver shipyards. He added.
