

Reid Supports Demand For Higher Egg Price

Shorten Japanese Hearings

LYTTON (CP) — Draught shortening of the time needed to hear Japanese property claims appeared possible today, following a federal order authorizing country courts to judge in various centres to hear much of the evidence submitted.

Mr. Justice Henry I. Birt, the one-man royal commission appointed to hear appeals against the curtailment of enemy property claims, said today that Justice Minister Hiley had approved such a measure. Mr. Justice Birt will initiate all hearings under the plan, with transcripts of evidence later heard by country court judges forwarded to him. It was hoped to thus shorten hearings scheduled for Kamloops, Vernon, Nelson and Grand Forks from 16 to four weeks.

BREAKDOWN OF GROUPS
A breakdown of individual claims showed 42 from Lillooet, 104 from Kamloops, 100 from Vernon, 112 from Grand Forks and 88 from Nelson.

Lethbridge, Alta., is scheduled to produce 368 claims; Moose Jaw, Sask., 15; Winnipeg, 129; Fort William, 37; Toronto, 274; Montreal, 53; and Vancouver only one.

With the deadline for entering claims one day away, it appeared unlikely the total would be increased. However, some appellants have more than one claim.

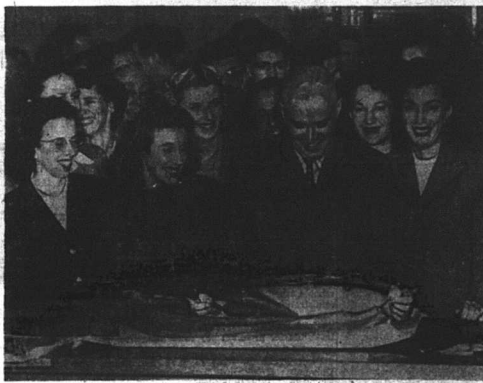
In yesterday's hearing here Majuro Shoji, formerly of Vancouver, entered a claim for \$13,041. He claimed \$12,200 for real property and \$841 for goods and chattels allegedly sold by the custodian of enemy property at prices below fair market value.

Real property consisted of his former residence and business building in Vancouver.

He testified he had paid \$18,000 for the factory buildings and land. The company owned the equipment.

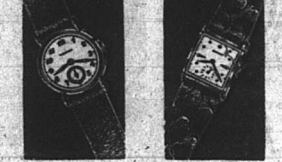
