### Ottawa Will Pay Claims of 1300

OTTAWA, June 13. — Justice Minister Garson announced today the government will pay \$1,222,829 to some 1300 Canadians of Japanese origin as the result of a commission study of claims that their British Columbia properties, seized in wartime, were sold too cheaply.

He tabled in the Commons the report of Mr. Justice H. I. Bird of the British Columbia Court of Appeal and praised the judge for his "monumental" work during a period of two years and four months.

Mr. Garson said the money to cover the claims will be appropriated from Parliament in the form of a supplementary estimate.

Mr. Garson said the commission reported in July, 1947, dealt in all with 1434 claims involving not only homes and farms but other businesses, cars, trucks and other possessions.
