WINNIPEG, Man., Jan. 12.—Order substantiated from the office of the Minister of National and Fisheries Commission, two firms of brokers are operating the books of the Winnipeg office of the Solloway Mills Ltd. brokerage firm.

The charge against Mr. Solloway and Mr. Mills apparently is that they used their nation-wide chain of forty-one brokerage houses to influence the buying and selling of all stocks in Canadian exchanges.

Wintery Blast Sweeps South to Mexican Border

WHILE Vancouver thermometers this morning were recording a new low temperature record for the winter, reports from Pacific Coast and mid-western cities of the United States told of the loss of at least six lives due to the week-end blizzard which reached south to the Mexican border.

Wintery took rank as the coldest place in the west overnight with 14 degrees below zero. In northern Manitoba the temperatures rose to zero. Medicine Hat, with 14 below, was the coldest place in Alberta.

At 8 o'clock this morning the official reading in Vancouver was 12 degrees above zero, compared with 14.7 above, the coldest record of the winter. Sunday night and this morning, was recording 14 degrees above zero. It was 12 below at Prince George.

The weather is rising over northern B. C. and colder weather may spread southward again, the weather report reads.

SCORE DIE ON NAVAL TUG

125-MILE GALE AT EASTBOURNE

LONDON ALMOST ISOLATED

LONDON, Jan. 13.—Thirty-five persons lost their lives in a terrific storm which swept England Sunday night.

Twenty-three of the victims were members of the crew of H.M.S. tug St. Genny, which sank during the night 30 miles north of Ushant Light.

Only five men were rescued from the 425-ton vessel, which was en route to Gibraltar for service with the Atlantic fleet. The tug belonged to a flotilla for target service.

There were at least twelve deaths on land. The wind reached a velocity of 125 miles an hour at Eastbourne and more than 100 miles an hour at other places.

ANOTHER BLOW APPROACHING

It subsided early today with as much suddenness as it had appeared earlier.

Falling trees were responsible for most of the casualties on land and for widespread cutting of telephone and telegraph lines and interruption of railway and highway traffic.

London was almost isolated so far as wire communication with other large centres was concerned.

SHEFFIELD, Jan. 12.—Great Britain is prepared to agree to the complete abolition of the submarines, declared the Right Honourable A. V. Alexander, first lord of the admiralty, in an address before his constituents here today.

2 MINERS TRAPPED BY BLAZE

Shaft in Hillside Becomes Their Tomb

HENDERSON, Ky., Jan. 12.—Far back in the Kentucky hills, Aaron Bridwell, 53, and Dorris Woods, 20, today were sealed tight in a blazing mine—a mine that will be their tomb.

The two men were working 300 feet back in a slope mine, one that goes into a hillside, late yesterday, when fire broke out in the entrance, trapping them. Gasoline from an engine pulling the wire car became ignited, spread, and in a few minutes the mine entrance was a blazing inferno.

COULD NOT ENTER
Carl Motton, owner of the mine, Henry Dixon and Ted Colton, were working on the outside as the fire started. They attempted to reach the miners, but could not get through the flames.

Calls for mine rescue crews were sent to Berea, Ind., Madisonville, and Sturgis, Ky., but it was late before aid arrived on Henderson and Henderson.

WINE IS SEALED
About an hour after the fire had started a signal bell which is operated by a cable from within the mine, rang once, faintly.

Watchers on the outside immediately dispatched the mine car into the tunnel but it came out empty.

It was thought that falling timber from the roof probably had trapped the men. At midnight last night G. P. Powell, Henderson, U. S. mine bureau inspector, and others were by candle light in the mine to be able to order the mine sealed to another fire.


