the Canadian Immigration Detention Shed having been arrested as an alien enemy. He is 46 years old and lives in a room at 391 Powell St. Vancouver. His wife and one daughter, age 11, reside in Japan.

2. The writer interviewed this man on Dec.15th, 1941 in an effort to obtain information which might prove of assistance to the Custodian of knewy Alien Property in the administration of his affairs. Uyenishi is known to the writer and has been under his surveillance for the past year for suspected infractions of our F.E.C.Regulations. He was strongly suspected of illegal dealings with Japanese wer loan and other Japanese bonds.

During 1940 this man was employed with G.M.Oliver & Go., local brokerage firm, as a stock salesmen. He sold quite a number of Japanese bonds to local Japanese which were payable in Sterling and French Frencs. He visited Japan early in 1941 and when he returned he was suspected of his illegal bond transactions. He is believed to have more recently been employed as a salesman with M.Furuya & Go.a local Japanese firm.

the East End Branch of the Bank of Montreal but there is now only a balance of about eighty five cents in this. Upenishi has a safety deposit box with this bank and the key to same is among his effects which are held by our office. Upenishi states that he has been purchasing the coupons from local Japanese who hold Japanese Sterling bonds. That a number of these coupons have been sent through the Bank of Montreal, East End, to London for collection and he expects a credit of about \$200, to be placed to his credit at this bank.

5. Uyenishi purchased a \$50. Victory Bond but has since been forced to sell this to the Bank of Montreal, East End Branch. He also held in his own name two, 100 pound Japanese Sterling Bonds but during this year he sold one of these to N.KAKUTANI at Britannia Beach and another to G.SHIMONO at Steveston. B.C.

but has been paying fifty cents per week for about ten years on a Frudential \$250. policy on his daughter, Northo. He has no car and claims to be free from debt. An effort will be made to verify the above information at a later date in cooperation with the Custodian of Ememy Alien Property.
