GENERAL SUMMARY

Mrs. Yone Ichikawa was the wife of an employee of the Takahashi Logging Camp at Call Creek, B.C. She made her declaration to the Custodian on April 2nd, 1942 and was first evacuated on May 3rd, 1942.

This file reveals no liabilities of any kind.

Yone Ichikawa declared ownership of a three room wooden house erected on a float made of logs and situated at the Takahashi Logging Camp, Call Creek, B.C. Her other possessions included 3 beds, 2 stoves, 6 chairs, 1 table, kitchen utensils, all stored at the K. Takahashi Logging Camp, Call Creek, B.C. Mr. John Peden, c/o Messrs. Tait & Marchant, Bank of Toronto Bldg., Victoria, B.C. purchased the interests of K. Takahashi and Co. Ltd., so on July 16, 1942 we advised them of the properties Mrs. Yone Ichikawa had listed with us and asked them to investigate and let us know if the house was properly closed and secured. We received no reply to that or our follow-up letter of September 17, 1942, so on October 14th we wrote direct to the Watchman, Takahashi Logging Camp, asking him if the three room house and contents as mentioned above were still there and intact. On November 12th, 1942 we asked him for a reply to letter of October 14th. On December 10th Mr. Hadley of Bones Bay wrote that he had towed the Ichikawa house and contents up the inlet to his own timber claim. It was without guard for about three weeks and the house was broken into and a box of tools belonging to TAMASE (file 10023) and an Aladdin Lamp belonging to Ushijima (Internee file 1081) were missing. He made many enquiries but could not locate these goods. He offered his assistance in keeping watch of the house which we accepted on December 16, 1942, and as far as we know he is still doing this.

On May 8th, 1943 we received a letter from the B. C. Security Commission enclosing the form on which Yone Ichikawa requested release of three wooden boxes and one large can, all containing kitchen utensils, to be shipped to her at Greenwood, B.C. from the Sawmill at Bones Bay, B.C. On May 11, 1943 we instructed Mr. Hadley to ship the goods and mark the freight charges collect for the account of the B. C. Security Commission as well as the bill of lading and bill for any other expenses incurred. We also asked him for a report on the Ichikawa property. Mr. Hadley found four wooden boxes containing kitchen utensils marked 'ICHIKAWA', and shipped them with the one large can to Mrs. I. Ichikawa at Greenwood on May 21st, 1943. Freight charges were 80¢. We asked B. C. Security Commission to refund Hadley this amount. The last report from Mr. Hadley under date of May 21, 1943 stated that the place is never without a watchman.

This file reveals no other properties of any kind.

Dear Sirs. —

Your letter of November 12  
received last boat day November 28th  
but the letter you speak of Oct 14th  
I have not yet received. Very likely  
it has gone to who ever would be  
watchman there at the time.

In regard to the Ichikawa belongings  
I am guarding them to the best of my  
ability. When the Clark & Pelson took  
over the Takahashi log Co I immediately  
made ready to move a mile or so further  
up the inlet to my claim of timber  
first towing the Ichikawa house &  
belongings up there intending to follow  
in a day or so with the mill but as  
the Clark & Pelson had no boat they  
asked me to remain there until they  
got a boat, which I did. It was

about three weeks later before I moved. It was then that I noticed that the house had been broken into and every thing had been looked over but the only things that I noticed missing was a box of tools belonging to <sup>10023</sup> T. Amari and an Aladdin lamp belonging to Uchiyama, I made many inquiries but never was able to find out who broke in.

We have moved again to Bone Bay since Oct 15 also brought the Uchiyama house along and is now tied up to our float<sup>11</sup> but it will soon have to be beached again as its float is very poor. Its care has been quite a problem and I would like very much to be free of it but on the other hand to crate all that stuff ready for shipping and transfer it to a boat stop would take quite a bit of time and I am so busy every hr of day light in the shingle mill trying to meet the urgent demand for shingles to the Fort Reliance Air Port. However

as long as I can keep the house within  
close quarters its contents is safe enough  
which at present I can do and as far  
as I know now we are permanent here  
for at least a year or two but should  
you wish to make arrangements for its  
removal I will be willing to assist in  
any way possible
