In his declaration he reported 3 trunks and 2 boxes of kitchen utensils were left in the Japanese Hall, Prince Rupert, B.C. On July 24, 1942 2 trunks and 2 boxes were forwarded to Vancouver and these were shipped to MIO in January, 1944. The other box was shipped to Vancouver and released to MIO on April 9, 1942. See below re 2 trunks & 2 boxes. ^{see 1/10/46}

The R.C.M.P. handed to this office a Stromberg-Carlson radio surrendered by this man. This radio was sold and the net proceeds of \$11.99 were credited to his account.

The account of this man was credited with the sum of \$2.87 received as refund of B. C. Electric Railway Co. security deposit for light.

This file reveals no other property of any kind.

In any case, Tomokichi MIO did not declare ownership of any vessel, so that he must have disposed of his interest in the vessel reported by the RCMP prior to the time he registered with the Custodian.

Claimant stated that he left all his goods at the Japanese Community Hall at Prince Rupert in 2 Trunks and 3 Boxes and stated that there was no such person as a Custodian there to hand them over to. Some other goods were stored in a friend's house at Cow Bay for which he is not claiming.

Claimant stated that the trunks contained goods which were gifts and wedding presents, and their clothing which they were not allowed to take away with them, but there was no detailed list made out. There seems to be some confusion and uncertainty as to the number of trunks and boxes.

Two trunks and two boxes were shipped from Prince Rupert to Vancouver also one box of tools by the B.C. Security Commission to Custodian's Storage in 1942. Claimant requested that the 2 trunks and 2 boxes be shipped to him but these could not be found in Custodian's storage in 1944. Claimant admitted having received a box of tools delivered to him at Vancouver.

It is submitted that these articles are exorbitant in value and whether the Custodian had custody or not or whether he had constructive custody will have to be decided in Vancouver and the Custodian does not deny that he got the 2 trunks and 2 boxes.
