Inventory No. 131 shows that a sewing machine, bed spring and mattress and dresser were moved under the name of "S. Iwamoto", 3015 Hall St., Vancouver. Would you kindly let us know to whom these goods have been credited.

Sadayoshi HAMBA, formerly of Woodfibre, reported in his declaration that a sewing machine, porcelain, kitchenware and silver plate packed in 2 boxes had been left with Mr. K. Iwamoto, 3015 Hall St. Vancouver. This, we believe, is Kunitaro IMAMOTO, file 6905, who formerly lived at 3015 Hall St.

We have no record of any chattels having been removed from 3015 Hall St. and we would like to know whether the chattels which are listed as having been removed from 3015 Hall St. were actually taken from Hall St. and what has happened to these chattels.

NAMBA in his declaration stated that he left a sewing machine, porcelain, kitchenware and silver plate with K. IMAMOTO, 3015 Hall St., Vancouver. There is no such street in Vancouver, and I assume that he meant, K. IMAMOTO, 3015 Wall St.

If this assumption is correct, then a reference to Kunitaro IMAMOTO's file, No. 6905, disclosed the fact that Mr. Green wrote to IMAMOTO in regard to his chattels:-

"Our representative visited your float house, found same water-logged 6" deep in water, doors left open, and no gramophone or records. The nature of the remaining chattels had the appearance of things that had been discarded by you prior to your evacuation."

NAMBA now requests shipment of a baby carriage. Whilst he declared a few chattels, he did not specifically declare a baby carriage, and the warehouse records do not show the arrival of such article from Woodfibre.

Mr. Green's memo to Mr. Alexander dated May 25th, 1942, on file G/45 indicates the mixed condition in which the chattels from Woodfibre reached Vancouver, and is enlightening but not helpful in tracing the baby carriage.

I have deleted the last portion of my memorandum of July 30th, 1943, as it is not related to this file.

I have searched the Woodfibre inventories but they are not helpful as many of the chattels were packed in boxes and cartons, and it might have been possible for a fragile baby carriage to be so packed.

I can offer no further suggestion and can only conclude that the baby carriage did not reach our warehouse or if it did, without proper identification, was confused by Cronos and given the name of another Japanese.

On March 15, 1946, we wrote to Mr. Wills inquiring to whom the goods listed under Inventory No. 131 were credited.

We also inquired as to what happened to the chattels removed from 3015 Hall St., as this would appear to be the address where Mr. NAMBA left a sewing machine, porcelain, kitchenware and silver, as there is no Hall St. in Vancouver. If chattels left at that address were in 6th of water as reported by Mr. Green to INAMOTO, where was the Inventory 131, with address as 3015 Hall St. made up from?

We would appreciate further information on the disposition of goods listed under Inventory No. 131.

Dear Sir:

With reference to your request for shipment of your baby carriage, we regret to inform you that we have been unable to find any record of this article, either in Vancouver or Woodfibre.

Chattels belonging to Evacuees were shipped to Vancouver in May, 1942, from Woodfibre, and were stored in Custodian warehouse under the name of the person in whose name each shipment was made. We have since found that in some cases errors were made in the shipments in that articles shipped in the name of one person actually belonged to another. The owners of the various chattels could be of much assistance to us in this, if they would give us complete details in regard to the goods left at Woodfibre.

If you will give us a complete description of the baby carriage we will check through all records of goods shipped from Woodfibre and endeavour to find if your baby carriage was shipped in the name of some other person. You might also give us information about the other articles you left at Woodfibre. Your declaration gives the following: 2 stoves, kitchen utensils, furniture and fixtures, and this does not give us much information to work on.

In any case, no baby carriages brought in from Woodfibre remain on hand, but it is possible that your carriage was sold and the proceeds credited to some other person because it was for some reason shipped with his goods.

In your declaration to the Custodian, you reported chattels left with Mr. Kunitaro IMAMOTO, 3015 Wall Street. Custodian representative called at 3015 Wall Street following the evacuation of the occupants of that building, but nothing was found in the float-house except some things which had the appearance of articles discarded by the owners. None of the items you declared were there. It is assumed therefore that you had taken your chattels with you.

Upon receipt of a reply in regard to articles left at Woodfibre, we will check our records of goods shipped from that point.
