

These buildings were on land belonging to Mr. T. SASAKI for which he paid a rental of \$20. a year. No arrangements were made between the two parties as to any removal of these buildings.

T. SASAKI wrote a letter 16/12/1934 stating that the building had only a wooden foundation and that claimant was the rightful owner and had the right to dispose of it as he wished, as long as he did not include the land in his sales.

These buildings were sold with the land and the sum of \$125. was credited to claimant, being the appraised value of the buildings.

Appraisers (Coulthard Sutherland)
report - All the buildings are in a
deplorable condition and of the
cheapest possible construction and
materials and should be demolished.

Claimant stated that the floats were moored to a post by means of a cable but he left nobody in charge of them, the actual buildings were locked and he kept the key. The floats were left moored.

There is no record of what happened

to these floats.

In his claim of 1940 he claimed \$35. for logging saws and in 1942 he still claimed that amount, stating that he considered they were still worth that amount.

It is submitted that the chattels sold or disposed of by the Custodian were sold at their fair market value and it is submitted that there are other articles declared by the claimant but not found and the Custodian is not responsible for them, but if he is responsible in any manner respecting this claim, the claim made by the claimant is exorbitant.
