

PERSONAL PROPERTY SUMMARY

This file reveals the above owned no real property in any protected area of B.C., and carried no Fire Insurance.

CHATELS: The above, who made his declaration to the Custodian on April 3/42 and was evacuated on June 1/42, declared a fishing vessel in custody at New Westminster; furniture, household effects and kitchen utensils as noted on Chattel Schedule, left in a four roomed house at the Phoenix Cannery, Steveston.

Goods found in Phoenix Cannery House #4 in the name of the above, were inventoried by Custodian agent, C.C. Robinson on June 26/42 as per List #62 on file, and removed to central storage.

Some of the goods were left in this house and have been abandoned as noted on the Schedule.

The remaining chattels were sold as per Chattel Schedule for the net sum of \$30.67, and this sum credited to the account of the above.

A copy of List #62 was sent to the above on No. 10/42 and he confirmed it on Nov. 17/42.

Although the above declared no nets, some were found bearing his name. We therefore sent him a net form to fill in and he returned this completed form on Nov. 20/43 giving us a list of his nets stored at the Phoenix Cannery. All nets found tagged with his name were inventoried by Custodian agent C.C. Robinson and given Custodian numbers. These nets were sold as shown on the net statement on file of Nov. 25/43 for a total of \$185.00 and this sum credited to the account of the above.

SPECIFIED ARTICLES: According to information supplied to this office the above was the registered owner of a fishing vessel, the "B.N." which was sold through the Japanese Fishing Vessel Disposal Committee for the net sum of \$319.25, which was disbursed as follows:

MR. COBUS: The claim, your honour, of Nakatsu, Buntaro, No. 64 on the Secretary's list, and it becomes case No. 304, I take it, Mr. Secretary.

THE SECRETARY: Case No. 304.

NATHAN BUNTARO, a witness called on behalf of the claimant herein, being first duly sworn, testified as follows:

10 MR. COBUS: I would ask leave, your honour, to amend the claim, which is a claim for personal property only, by deleting the first three lines under 5 (a), that is, abandoning the fishing vessel claim, subject, of course, to the Terms of Reference being broadened; deleting the following lines two and three. Item 4 remains "Nets, cork lines and lead lines", but the amount has been amended to \$550.00.

THE COMMISSIONER: \$550.00.

20 MR. COBUS: Item 5, "Chattels" remains at \$100.00, and we show the credits in two amounts, the credits for nets and lines, \$185.00, and the credits for chattels, \$40.05, making total credits of \$225.05. The net claim becomes \$424.95.

DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. COBUS:

Q: How are you related to the claimant, Buntaro Nakatsu? As he is my husband.

Q: And he has authorized you and wishes you to give evidence with respect to the claim which he submitted, is that correct?

A: Yes.

Q: I produce to you, witness, a statement concerning the nets and lines for which your husband has submitted a claim. Did you instruct Mr. Leckie to prepare this statement for you and is that your signature there? A: Yes.

10 Q: In your statement, witness, you refer to a list attached to your statement. I produce to you a list of nets and lines. Was that list prepared by you or for you?

A: I had it written for me.

Q: And is that the list to which you make reference in your statement? A: Yes.

Q: Did you discuss the matters concerning the nets, that is, as to the type of net and the age at evacuation and the original value and the estimated value with your husband?

20

A: Yes.

Q: And are the statements contained in the statement and list attached thereto true to the best of your knowledge and recollection?

A: Yes.

MR. COBUS: I would ask leave, your honour, to file the statement concerning the nets and the list attached as one exhibit.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 1)

30 MR. COBUS: Referring to Exhibit, 1, your honour, the

witness has set out the total estimated value of the nets as being \$400.00 and lines \$150.00, making a total value of the nets and lines claimed \$550.00. The witness says that the nets and lines were left in the warehouse of the Phoenix Cannery at Steveston, B.C. The only comment she makes is that depreciation has been allowed on these nets and lines and that she is representing her husband as to this claim. The husband is unable to be here and she has knowledge as to the facts relating to these nets and lines.

Referring to the attached list, your honour, The list the claimant was able to prepare is perhaps not the most desirable list, but it appears to have been the best she could do, and it indicates that all nets were three years old, that the lead and float lines were three years old, and that the gear was used two months in the year. The original value of the nets is lumped at \$600.00, and the lead and float lines at \$200.00, and the estimated value at evacuation is broken down into nets and lines as covered in the statement.

Q: Witness, I produce to you a statement concerning the personal chattels for which your husband is making a claim. Did you instruct Mr. Lockie to prepare this statement and is that your signature?

At Yes.

Q: Are the statements true to the best of your knowledge and recollection?

At Yes.

Q: In your statement you make reference to a list of chattels for which claim is being made. I produce to you a list showing a series of items with a limited number of details to the right of it, and showing an estimated value for all of the items at the date of evacuation to be \$100.00. Did you prepare this list or have it prepared for you?

A: Yes.

10 Q: In arriving at this figure \$100.00 as representing the estimated value of all of the goods at the date of evacuation, can you tell me how you arrived at that figure?

A: I didn't quite remember what I had there, so I estimated they were worth about \$100.00.

Q: Would you say they were worth more than \$100.00 or is \$100.00 a conservative estimate?

A: I thought that was a fair price.

20 MR. COBUS: I ask leave, your honour, to file the statement concerning personal chattels and list attached as one exhibit.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 2)

30 MR. COBUS: Referring to Exhibit 2, your honour, the goods were left in the home of the claimant at No. 4 house Phoenix Cannery, Steveston. The only comment she makes is that they have allowed for depreciation. She says that she is representing her husband in the matter of this claim as he is unable to appear. She says, too, that she has full knowledge of these

chattels.

I would ask my learned friend to produce
the Analysis of Personal Property Claim.

(Handed to Mr. Cobus)

MR. COBUS: I have, produced from the Custodian's
file, your honour, the Analysis of Personal
Property Claim for Nakatsu, Buntaro. I ask
leave to file it on behalf of the Crown.

(ANALYSIS MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 3)

10 MR. COBUS: Referring to Exhibit 3, your honour, I
would point out that details of the nets were
returned to the Custodian on November 20, 1943,
certain articles were removed to storage, and
it will be seen that the items listed on that stor-
age list are the very items for which the claim-
ant is submitting a claim. With respect to the
nets and lines for which claim is being made,
and details of which are shown in column 3 of
Exhibit 3, sales were made in the amount of
20 \$125.00 by tender.

Would my learned friend produce the details
of the sales by tender of nets and cork and lead
lines?

MR. McINNES: I have a net statement here, if that
is what you want.

MR. COBUS: I have, produced from the Custodian's
file, your honour, a net statement concerning
the nets and lines of the claimant, Nakatsu
Buntaro, dated November 25, 1943, and the
30 total sales shown thereon amount to \$125.00 which

corresponds with the amount shown in Exhibit 3; two nets are shown as unaccounted for, and two nets are shown appraised as of no value, November 4, 1943.

I would ask to file the net statement on behalf of the Crown.

(STATEMENT MARKED EXHIBIT NO. 4)

10 MR. COBUS: I would point out that the declaration of November 20, 1943 is matched by the net statement just filed.

Your witness.

MR. McINNES: It will be submitted, your honour, in the first place, that the nets were never declared in the J.P. form. It was only after repeated letters from the Custodian that we got the information about the nets a year and a half later. Those nets which were found and accounted for and which were saleable were sold for their fair market value. With regard to the list of
20 chattels, it is submitted that these were sold for their fair market value.

I see no object in cross-examining this witness because it is obvious she knows nothing about the nets.

MR. COBUS: Q: Witness, can you tell me whether you or your husband gave the Phoenix Cannery a list of the nets and lines which you left there?

20 A: Yes, I gave it to the Custodian. I gave them a list of the things and told them that I had left it at the Phoenix Cannery.

Q: Yes, I know. I didn't ask that. I would like to know whether you or your husband, at the time you put the nets into the Phoenix Cannery, had given anyone at the cannery a list of these nets at the cannery.

A: I don't know.

MR. CONUS: That is all, your honour.

THE COMMISSIONER: Well, that is all for the present then, thank you, witness.
